President's Notebook

AGM

The Crescent Heights Community Association's 2013 Annual General Meeting was held on April 25. It was a quiet affair, hardly the barn-burner that was the first AGM I attended, during a time of transition and strife, back in 2001. No shouts or recriminations, no departing board members were urged to "not let the door hit your ass on the way out", as a certain Mr. Smith exhorted and one person making a beeline for the side door. Those were the days. This year, indeed, we were able to entice two new board members to join those of their colleagues who will continue through 2013 and into 2014. All but one of our three board vacancies were thus filled. We welcome Stephanie Ho Lem and Mike Jancovic to roles that will be determined when the new board first meets in mid-May. At that time the new board will review its roles and responsibilities and perhaps define some new or newly-assigned "portfolios". Thanks to everyone who came out and helped make the AGM a crisp and snappy business meeting, following which we adjourned to cheese, fruit and an inky-black and nicely perfumed Andeluna Malbec.

River and Pathway Clean-up

This year's River and Pathway Clean-up drew only about ten people. This is an annual undertaking on the part of CHCA in which many hands usually make light work. This year was heavy going: many encampments, a good deal of accumulation of refuse and debris since the 2012 clean-up. Volunteers from the Neighbour to Neighbour group made up a significant segment of our crew, and tackled McHugh Bluff from Edmonton Trail to Centre Street. That slope seems to have become Calgary's newest unofficial urban campground. Police, Parks and Bylaw were contacted to deal with the encampments, as is the advice of event organizers. Please consider the clean-up for next year as this was very hard work for so few volunteers: so much so we were compelled to seek refreshment and restorative comestibles at Fiddler's Courtyard after the event.

CHCA Flooring Project

Special thanks once again to Kellee Grounds for her project management skills in driving the recent removal of our old main floor surface in the hall, the removal and abatement of asbestos that was part of that original floor beneath, and the installation of a fine new cushioned floor. The new surface will be more user-friendly, especially to the fitness, dance and tai chi groups that are booked into the hall with increasing regularity. The new flooring material is thicker, has more "give" and is a warmer and more welcoming surface to anyone inclined to flop down and roll around on it. The hall flooring project benefited from generous grant funding from the Community Infrastructure Improvement Fund, administered by Western Economic Diversification Canada, and our Member of Parliament, Michelle Rempel. What was top secret until the formal announcement on May 15 can now be revealed. Not since the significant federal contribution to the Splash Park in Rotary Park have we benefited so significantly from the federal government's Economic Action Plan. Our hall is not so very old and it is not a complicated building, but it is an increasingly busy facility, and everyday wear and tear was certainly starting to show. This generous grant contribution gave us great leverage and the opportunity to properly get rid of the asbestos in the hall that was unknown to us (and beyond

our means) when the floor was last done some eight years ago. Thanks again to everyone at WED, to MP Michelle Rempel and her staff, and to the various CHCA board members who were in and out of the hall, moving stuff around and in and out, while the project proceeded.

Rotary Park Lawn Bowling Club

The RPLBC's 2013 Annual Spring Meeting went ahead on April 17 just ahead of the opening of the season. It was held in their lovely new clubhouse in Rotary Park. If you've never tried lawn bowling, you may be unaware of the local treasure that is RPLBC. Check out their website for information on how you can try your hand at lawn bowling and perhaps join one of their weekday evening fun leagues: the bowl, the jack and a frosty beverage make a lovely way to wile away a summer evening.

Edmonton Trail Visioning

On April 20 it was off to Renfrew to see and hear the further results of the Edmonton Trail Visioning project and learn some essential lessons in how the North Central LRT project will almost certainly relocate from the Nose Creek Valley (parallel to Deerfoot Trail) and find a more appropriate alignment in the Centre Street North or Edmonton Trail corridor. Students from the U of C's Urban Planning program have been working on various iterations of a Future Edmonton Trail streetscape, as communities adjacent participated with keen interest. As I have questioned in recent months in these pages as to how a single North Central Rail line could serve both local needs and the rather different longer-line commuter needs for

residents north of Beddington Trail and even Stoney Trail, the technology that will build NCLRT is very different from the old way of doing LRT, old meaning high floor trains, massive land-and-building-sucking rights of way and imposing stations on the ground or up in the air. Old LRT, taking form as recently as the new West leg, will give way to low-floor, community friendly tram-like rolling stock, and we will almost certainly be part of it. Read on.

North Central LRT Citizen Consultation Group

On May 6 Crescent Heights was very well represented at the second gathering of the North Central LRT Consultation Committee. Watch for three events in June to formally begin the discussion and sign onto our e-mail list for timely announcements. Thus far Crescent Heights is represented by one skeptic and one unabashed booster of the possible Centre Street alignment (me). Have your say in June and on into the future. The secret to the future North Central line being a community builder rather than a community destroyer is the low-floor tram-like nature of the current and future technology that will shape the project. My skepticism that arose when a Centre Street alignment first came open for discussion was a very valid concern about how the line could be both a pedestrian and community-friendly local line, connecting Crescent Heights to the wider municipal transportation network, and also an efficient commuter line for communities much farther north along the line. The answer appears to be in the amazing technology that is only bound to become more sophisticated

in the years ahead as planning and implementation advance for NCLRT: Yes, the low-floor trams or trains can effectively serve both a local line and a commuter line: they can move within existing traffic flows close in, and achieve higher speeds in less built-up areas on par with the old LRT model. Close in, trams will be accessible almost block by block in the inner city and move more slowly with existing traffic flows, but as they leave the inner city, stations or access points would be more widely spaced, speeds would increase to suit conditions, but both the long-line commuter and the local user connect with the same technology platform. Take a look at the technology currently on offer by googling Siemens or Bombardier, adding simply "low floor" to the search, and see what awaits. I believe that NCLRT planning discussions are not just a means of acceding to a future light rail line, but an opportunity to fight tooth and nail for it, and for the enhanced pedestrian realm that will coexist and interact with it. Anyone who had the misfortune of walking the Centre Street corridor in our community on the Inspiring Strong Communities walk on April 6 saw it: the dreary, blighted and miserable stretch of transportation corridor that we call Centre Street: a failing commercial corridor that divides our community rather than draws residents to it. North Central LRT is possibly the last best chance to save Centre Street from itself and transform it to a local high street for the general benefit of the community.

Dragonfly Co-housing Groundbreaking

On May 11 it was off to 1st Avenue and 3rd Street NE to cheer on the groundbreaking ceremony for the Dragonfly Co-housing project. It was a beautiful Spring Saturday afternoon as about 50-60 people, most soon-to-be new Crescent Heights Residents, gathered with community members to welcome our new community-within-the-community. Dragonfly will be a 36-unit condominium project in which a few units are still believed to be available. Check out their website for further details and watch the actual site over the next 12 months as construction begins and proceeds. Welcome Dragonflies.

Departing CHCA Directors

The AGM also took formal note of and expressed thanks to some departing CHCA directors. You may recall Dave Dearborn's decision last autumn to give up his Parks and Garden position to focus more on dayto-day operational tasks associated with the community, and that he has done indeed. The CHCA hockey and pleasure rinks benefited from Dave's attention, together with the rest of Tim Edwards' rink crew, and Dave has continued to be very active, most recently participating in an Iron Man event in South Africa. Thanks to Dave for his wise counsel and great good sense throughout his time with the board. Jack Lawson, our Crime Prevention Director for the past couple of years, has also decided to step aside. It was during Jack's tenure that the Building Safe Communities initiative arrived in Crescent Heights. The Neighbour to Neighbour group will continue to prosper through Jack's active involvement. Our ties to many businesses in the Edmonton Trail corridor are much stronger as a result of Jack's ongoing outreach to our commercial neighbours through N2N and CHCA. However, I don't believe he is going to give back the Gatling gun that was part of the Crime Prevention Director's "portfolio", so if you are walking in the area of 2nd Street and 1st Avenue NE, just keep moving, and don't think about dropping that empty Tim Horton's cup on the ground or doing a drug deal in the area, or Jack will be happy to ventilate you from his nearby balcony.

Me Too

After finally tallying it up, and finding it to be 12 years on the CHCA board of directors, the last seven as president, I discover my best before date has come and gone. I'll be saddling up and moving on as well. I will call our May 14 board meeting to order, then our executive and other positions will be repopulated and, as is our custom at the first board meeting after the AGM, some board positions will be no doubt re-defined to suit the priorities of the incoming board. Over my tenure on the board we have built up the community's finances and continued a strong tradition of very prudent and cautious financial management. So we are in a very fine fiscal position to meet the challenges that will certainly arise in the coming years. We have a full tank of gas and the CHCA is in a position to move in whatever direction the current and future membership wants it to take. By far the best of it has been the people I've met and worked with on various events, projects and initiatives. I came to the community by way of an epic development battle, but we stayed on to work with the people who helped us and our neighbours in that struggle. There have been other battles since then, some won, some lost, but the Crescent Heights residents we've worked and had fun with have been the finest, smartest, most compassionate and caring people that I've ever had the pleasure to meet. I've lived in Crescent Heights for more than 30 years but I've never felt so much at home as I have in the last 12 during which I have been active with our community association. You beauties you. Onward.

Message from your Alderman

Welcome news for homeowners in communities with aging infrastructure!

In March, City Council voted to change the local improvement bylaw, ending the previous 50% cost-sharing policy for sidewalk replacement work. From now on, when The City identifies a portion of sidewalk, curb, or gutter for replacement, adjacent residents will not be charged for the work.

It has long been an area of contention that a homeowner must pay for what is considered normal lifecycle maintenance. Historically, The City shared the cost with adjacent residents who benefited from the renewed infrastructure. Residents had the option to pay an upfront one-time payment or an annual amount that was included in their property tax bill for up to 15 years. Residents who objected to the local improvement were required to petition their neighbours for a two-thirds majority.

The new policy applies to projects initiated by The City from the 2012 local improvement bylaws onward. The local improvement cost-sharing rules still apply when residents request their own local improvements for concrete repairs and replacement.

Rather than requiring a tax increase to pay for this program, Council was able to find funding by allocating \$1.4 million from tax room identified during November's budget discussions. Calgarians can still expect reliable infrastructure to be installed and maintained in their communities, while not having to bear the previously required 50% cost.

Backyard Play Safety



With summer fast approaching, Alberta Health Services EMS would like to encourage parents to ensure their backyard play areas are made safe. Direct supervision is the best method to reduce the chance of injury. It is also prudent to ensure play equipment in your yard is suitable for the age and skill of the children using it. Don't forget to check the equipment often and repair any worn or broken parts. Set up play equipment on 8 to 12 inches of a shock-absorbing surface such as sand, wood chips, or pea gravel. Grass will not adequately cushion a fall.

Water hazards

- Ensure all backyard swimming pools are fenced. The fence should be at least 1.5 metres (5 feet) high and have a selflatching, self-closing, lockable gate:
- Drowning is the leading cause of unintentional injury-related death among children ages one to four;
- Children can drown in just a few centimetres of water if it covers their mouth and nose.

Lawn and garden tools

- Keep young children away from outdoor power equipment. Serious burns may result from touching hot engine surfaces;
- Ensure that all tools, fuel, chemicals, and other hazardous substances are stored in a secure, locked area. A simple latch may not be sufficient.

Insect bites and stings

- Minimize the risk of attracting insects by not wearing strong perfumes or scented lotions;
- Avoid wearing brightly coloured clothing outdoors;
- Destroy or re-locate hives and nests situated near your home;
- To avoid a bite in case of accidentally stepping on a stinging insect always ensure you child wears shoes or sandals:
- If your child has received an 'EpiPenJr' prescription from your physician (for serious anaphylactic emergencies only) ensure they understand when and how to use it;
- If your child experiences a severe reaction to an insect sting, seek medical attention or call 9-1-1.

Community Liaison Officer Monthly Report

The Hub

In support of community engagement efforts, The Calgary Police Service is pleased to introduce The Hub Messaging System, a community automated notification system that delivers vital information to residents and business owners within the City of Calgary.

The Hub Messaging System will utilize sophisticated software by strategically sending information to a selected geographic area made possible through a community member sign-up webpage. Messages will be prepared and delivered by the Calgary Police Service through email, voice, and text messaging. Message types and user delivery profiles can be tailored to meet the needs and preferences for each registered community member. Community members can choose to change their profile or unsubscribe at any time.

Types of messages

The Hub Messaging System will transmit messages using landline and cellular telephone options. The registration page enables community members to create a user profile which will specify the message types that the community member wishes to receive and restrict the types that are not desired. E-Alert will send informative messages ranging from city events to safety notifications and emergency incidents. The following are examples of message types that will be delivered:

- Community events
- · Information alerts
- Existing Amber alerts
- Missing persons
- Emergency incidents
- · Neighbourhood crime alerts
- Threats to school safety
- Public warnings
- Crime prevention information

Registration

Residents and business owners within the city of Calgary who wish to enroll in The Hub Messaging System will soon be able to register by completing an online form or at their local police district office.

You will be required to create a Hub Messaging user profile by completing all required fields on the registration form. Your user profile will increase the speed in which the system delivers messages, and will identify the

geographic area where the messages are to be delivered. You also have the option to edit your online user profile or unsubscribe at any time.

Message delivery options

The Hub Messaging System is available to all community members who work or live in the city of Calgary, or within the local calling area. Long distance numbers will not be accessible and messages will not be delivered to these numbers.

Phone message option - Community members who select messages to be delivered to their home or cellular telephone will receive calls from The Hub Messaging System with a pre-recorded message. If the telephone is not answered, Hub Messaging will leave a message at the end of the voice mail greeting.

Text message option - Community members who choose the text to be delivered to their home or cellular telephone will receive calls from Hub Messaging on their cellular or smart phone devices. Please note your phone carrier may charge you for incoming text messages.

E-mail message option - Community members are able to choose to receive email notifications sent to an e-mail address.





Parking Lot Lighting Upgrade Saves Money and Benefits the Environment

Energy conservation is top of mind when thinking about being environmentally friendly. Keep the heat low, turn off lights and buy energy efficient bulbs. Just like we buy energy efficient bulbs for our home lighting, The City of Calgary has started to purchase energy efficient for City lighting. A recent lighting upgrade at the Brentwood LRT parking lot is forecast to save \$550 per month energy costs.

City lights are generally only replaced when they burn out, but a hail storm in 2010 caused so much damage to the lights at the Brentwood LRT parking lot, that The City took the opportunity to retrofit all of the lights in the parking lot with Light Emitting Diode (LED) lighting as part of a pilot project. The old High Pressure Sodium (HPS) double lamps were replaced with LED single lamps which resulted in a system wattage reduction of 70 per cent.

"This project is a great example of our goal to improve Triple Bottom Line (TBL) outcomes," says Ron Raymond, Energy Management Manager. "The upgrade addresses financial, social and environmental factors."

The new fixtures use less energy and therefore cost less to run, and they last longer which decreases maintenance costs. And because the lights have no mercury content, the project reduced environmental hazards.

An added bonus of the upgrade is the improved security. The new lights increase lighting uniformity and quality making Calgary Transit's CCTV video footage clearer so that people are more identifiable. Transit Protective services are responsible for monitoring the video footage.

The project was collaboratively planned and delivered through a partnership between Calgary Transit and Infrastructure & Information Services(IIS). IIS is a business unit within The City that provided Sustainable Buildings Partnership Program funding and technical support and is now monitoring the project performance. The pilot at Brentwood LRT was such a success that these partnering business units are now delivering upgrades for 10 more LRT stations across the city. 
Returning participants can use their sign from last year. If your sign was destroyed by Calgary weather or you recycled it, we'll give you a new one.



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

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




Down with Noxious Weeds!

Have you ever wondered what those crazy people are doing, weeding on McHugh Bluff? Why the heck aren't they at home, weeding in their own back yards? McHugh Bluff is one of 7 designated parks included in the **City of Calgary's Community Stewardship for Biodiversity Program**, which engages citizens in research, education and stewardship activities with regards to invasive species. The other parks in the program are Baker Park, Canmore Park, Nose Hill & Whispering Woods, Weaselhead and the Glenmore Reservoir. On McHugh Bluff, the Biodiversity Program has selected two invasive species because they are appropriate for hand-pulling: Goatsbeard, which is tackled in the month of June (before the flowers go to seed), and Baby's Breath, which is hand-dug in the month of August. Interestingly, Goatsbeard isn't on our provincial noxious plant list, but the biodiversity experts have seen the impact that it has had on McHugh Bluff and are attempting to control the infestation. City employees cannot do this alone - did you know that there are 5300 green spaces in the City of Calgary, making up 12% of the City's land? Book Review by Judith Umbach

No Time Like the Present

by Nadine Gordimer




The liberation of South Africa was a fundamental aspiration for people in the 1960s through the 1980s. In No Time Like the Present, Nadine Gordimer, the preeminent South African writer, brings us into the lives of Steve and Jabu, children of the struggle and travellers into the present. They married when it was illegal for a mixed-race couple, they moved to a suburb with their comrades from the struggle, they had children, and they developed "ordinary" careers. Is this not the life they desired?

The present has been disillusioning for Steve and Jabu. As the novel evolves they have to overlook many compromises, for everyone must understand that reality is never as good as the country of their dreams. Yes, voting is a right for all, and it was well exercised. But after Mandela, Mbeki was a disappointment. And after him, Zuma is frightening. Or are they being too demanding of their politicians. Are these leaders worse than those in other countries?

Social problems abound. Jabu is a lawyer in the Justice Centre. Daily she sees the destitute suffer from lack of services, work and family. AIDS is a scourge. The increasing number of refugees from Zimbabwe

is blamed for much disorder, a blame made violent by impoverished locals who seek a focus for their frustration. Steve is a university



instructor who seeks to interpret and implement the principles of freedom in the classes of his institution. He recognizes that young people taught so poorly under apartheid cannot quickly become viable university students. Unfortunately, education is one of the lower priorities of successive governments with too many priorities; thus, educational standards are not improving. When will they, if ever?

Rising above this litany of disasters is the loving marriage of Steve and Jabu. Nadine Gordimer has accomplished one of the most difficult feats in literature - evoking the steady, warm, supportive joy of a good marriage. Their children are anchored by a good family life, allowing them to pursue their individual interests and friends. However, as their children grow through their teen years, Steve and Jabu are forced to confront the staggering difference between the society they wanted for their family and the society outside the doors of their home.

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
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
