

Some Notable Crescent Heights "Century Homes"- continued

On the heels of a three month hiatus, we'll move along this month to cover some prominent Century Homes found on the western side of Centre Street, two of which are no longer standing. But before doing so, we'll remind our readers that our two articles on Century Homes have been penned to advertise the fact that the Century Homes Calgary celebration continues this year, and will run from July 26 through August 5th. At press time, over 25 homes locally have signed up, and during the event each will display a banner and sign relating a bit of their home's past. A tour map including all Calgary homes registered in 2013 is available online and more details can be found at centuryhomes.org. A change from last year is that all homes built in the early part of the 20th Century are now encouraged to participate, as are schools, churches and commercial buildings of that same vintage.



102 Crescent Road NW

In February 1999, one of Crescent Heights' most distinctive homes - the venerable Buena Vistawas destroyed by fire.

The house was built circa 1906 by Thomas Clouston, a painter/decorator/businessman of English descent. The two-and-a-half storey 6000 square foot Queen Anne Tudor-style home originally occupied three city lots overlooking the city at 102 Crescent Road NW and was constructed of brick trimmed with sandstone. The architect was Leo Dowler, who lived nearby on Sunnyside Boulevard and who was responsible for designing the McArthur residence, also on Crescent Road.

In the mid-1920's, the Cloustons began to develop suites in the Buena Vista, so named for its commanding view of both the city and the mountains. In all, seven suites would eventually be built, including the one in which the owners resided. Mrs. Clouston passed away in 1928 and that same year-just prior to his own demise- Thomas Clouston sold the property for \$28,000 to Edna Atkinson, a single schoolteacher at Crescent Heights High who later married one of her tenants, Leonard Jordhoy. Because she risked losing her teaching job (really!) were she to have been married while still employed, her marriage took place the same year she retired, in 1943. Leonard was a widower with a young son, and the couple later adopted a 2 year old girl, in 1951. Leonard passed away in 1975 and after Edna's death in 1984, the Buena Vista was sold by their grown children to a local doctor who resided elsewhere; it was allowed to deteriorate thereafter until 1999 when it was destroyed in a fire apparently caused by squatters. Its owner elected not to attempt reconstruction and the charred remains of the Buena Vista were thereafter demolished. The property was sold in 2004 for its land value of \$1,100,000.

From 2004 through 2006, a new 6800 square foot home arose on the site of the Buena Vista. In June 2008, Jim and Margaret Shaw purchased the home for the princely sum of \$7,500,000, then establishing a Calgary MLS record. With the 2011 addition of a 10,560 square foot section of land at the top of McHugh Bluff- previously zoned as road allowance- the home was again listed for sale in 2012, this time at \$11,500,000. So far there are no takers.



720 - 1 St NW

This two-and-a-half storey "balloon"-framed wood-sided house dates back to 1903, which makes it undoubtedly the oldest house in the 'hood. It features a sandstone foundation and a mansard-style roof with gabled dormers. Since the first Centre Street Bridge wasn't built until 1907, building materials were probably transported over the Bow River via Fogg's Ferry, operating in the area since 1882. An early resident of the home was John Steinbrecher, who founded the German-American Colonization Company in 1906 with the intent of bringing Germans from the U.S. to Canada and settling as many as possible in Calgary and the surrounding area. In 1910, the company sold over 100,000 acres of southern Alberta farmland as well as city lots worth over \$1 million. Subdivisions were established in Calgary by the company for "Germans moving out of Riverside and Bridgeland". These new areas included Balmoral, Avondale, Balfour, La Grange, Highland Park, and Pullman, some of which only ever existed on paper. John Steinbrecher was 59 when the 1911 federal census-taker came to call;

Heat Related



With the return of warmer weather, Alberta Health Services EMS would like to remind citizens to stay safe in the heat and sun this summer. While children and the elderly can be more susceptible to the effects of heat, basic prevention measures should be taken by all to avoid a heat related illness during periods of hot and humid weather.

Heat exhaustion

- Heat exhaustion can occur due to excessive fluid loss during periods of prolonged sweating in a hot and / or humid environment (indoors or outdoors).
- Patients may suffer headaches, weakness, fatigue, nausea / vomiting, thirst, chills, and profuse sweating.
- The patient is usually cold and damp to the touch and the skin may appear pale or dusky gray.

Heat stroke

- Heat stroke is a medical emergency that requires prompt treatment. It can be fatal.
- It occurs when the body can't cool itself naturally (e.g. perspiration). The body's temperature will continue to rise to dangerous levels.
- Due to severe dehydration and the inability to sweat the patient may appear flushed and skin may be hot and dry to the touch.

First aid

- First aid for all heat related illness begins with removing or sheltering the patient from the hot environment.
- Remove excess or tight fitting clothing and allow them to rest in a cool environment.
- If the patient is conscious and alert, provide suitable fluids such as water, juice, or a sports drink.
- If you are concerned, seek medical attention or call 9-1-1.

Prevention

- Stay well-hydrated by drinking plenty of water.
- Limit alcohol consumption as alcohol dehydrates you.
- Always wear a broad brimmed hat to keep the sun off your face and neck.
- Apply waterproof sunscreen with an SPF of 50+, especially for children. The sun's UV rays peak between 10am-4pm, even on cloudy days.

he had been born in Russia of German ancestry. His American-born wife Rose was 44 and was of Welsh extraction. There were five Steinbrecher children residing in the house in 1911; the youngest was Herbert, age 2, and the oldest was Arthur, who at 32 was involved with his father in real estate, as were the two eldest daughters Minnie (21) and Sarah (19), both as stenographers. Needless to say, the onset of the Great War in 1914 threw a spanner into the works as far as German immigration to Canada was concerned, and the Steinbrecher family are not shown as residents in this house, or in Calgary for that matter, after 1916.

In the early years, the house was known as Lincoln Corner, a reference to the 1910 sidewalk stamp which although misspelled, denotes Lincoln (now 7th) Avenue, and which can still be seen on the southeast corner of 7th Avenue at 1st St NW. Following the Steinbrechers' departure and until 1926, the home was occupied by William Nettleton, an assistant manager at Birks and Sons; Mr. Nettleton and his wife then moved next door to 129 - 7 Ave NW, where they resided for many years thereafter. A resident in 1931 was Mrs Eva MacDonald, who operated the Crescent Road Miniature Golf Club, the exact location of which is a matter of conjecture. From then on the home sat vacant for three or four years; by 1938 it had been duplexed. By 1950 it had been converted to a triplex and it was about this time that the property was subdivided to allow for the construction of a bungalow on the southern part of the property. T

he 1950s through the 1980s saw a parade of tenants; at the date of its purchase as a distress sale by its present owner in the late 1990's, it contained no less than five suites. Its current owner also reports that the house appears to have once contained a structural extension on the south side of the building. During the 1980's, an attached garage was built on the eastern side of the building, providing access via 7th Avenue NW. Happily once again in the charge of a caring owner, the home at Lincoln Corner has reverted to single family dwelling status, and exterior renovations begun a few years ago are nearing completion.



208 Crescent Road NW

Archibald John McArthur ("A.J.") was born in 1857 on the island of lona, off the west coast of Scotland. At the age of four, his parents immigrated to Bruce County, Ontario where they farmed. After spending some time in the lumber business in Paisley Ontario, A.J. moved west in the late 1880s and settled in the Calgary area in December 1890 to ranch and to trade livestock. He married Catherine McCannel of Burgoyne, Ontario in 1902. By 1906 the McArthurs were already a family of considerable means.

A.J. McArthur's presence on the North Hill first manifested itself in a big way during 1906 when he purchased two adjacent quarter sections of land bounded by 16th Avenue (the section road) on the north, the Bow River environs to the south, with boundaries to the east at 1st Street East and to the west at 4th Street West. It thus took in much of the original village of Crescent Heights. The two subject quarter sections had first been homesteaded in the mid-1880s, some 20 years prior to McArthur's purchase. Within a month of McArthur taking possession of his North Hill property, he filed for subdivision on the north quarter section, and from then until 1910 sold off one acre lots between 13th and 16th Avenue to speculators many of whom in turn subdivided their property into 25 foot building lots.

One of McArthur's strongest allegiances lay with the Baptist Church; by 1905 he was already a prominent member of First Baptist Church. In addition to making his real estate office available for both Sunday school meetings and for temporary pastoral lodgings, he initiated a drive to construct a local church in 1907 and made 3 building lots available for this purpose. Not long after, he expressed his willingness to provide a further 12 acre parcel, located on the present site of Crescent Park, to the Baptist Union of Western Canada for the purpose of building a Baptist College on the site. It was his wish that his two boys, Peter, born in 1903 and Archibald (Alex), born in 1905, would attend there.

In addition to A.J.'s subdivision activities, he wasted no time in erecting a handsome brick residence trimmed with sandstone on his south quarter section, just west of 1st Street NW between 7th and 8th Avenues, about where the north parking lot of the LDS church is now located. The house was designed by architect Leo Dowler and was built circa 1907.

McArthur had political aspirations and in an 1910 by-election became the Liberal MPP (MLA) for the riding of Gleichen (in 1910, the provincial riding of Gleichen took in much of the suburban area north of the city limits of Calgary, including Crescent Heights). Sadly, A.J. would not even complete one full term as MPP. In June 1911, following an equestrian accident, he succumbed to respiratory complications and passed away at the age of 54. Upon A.J.'s demise, Catherine was immediately forced to take charge of a complex estate not only heavily concentrated in real estate but one with comparatively little in the way of liquid assets. Just as Catherine was finally in a legal position to begin liquidating estate assets, the Calgary real estate boom collapsed. Conditions deteriorated further when war broke out in 1914, making it challenging for her to generate income for her and her family. She continued to reside in her Crescent Heights home until she passed away in December 1943 at the age of 82, and the home was sold thereafter. It was demolished in the early 60's as the LDS church immediately to the south required additional space to accommodate church expansion.

1317 - 1 St NW (Wild Rose United Church)

Our article concludes with a look at a local church participating in the 2013 edition of Century Homes Calgary; we hope other churches in our community will be inspired to tell their stories too.

In 1908, a group of Scottish Presbyterians first held church services in a tent near 16th Avenue NW. By 1910, services were held in the Crescent Heights fire hall on the NE corner of 16th Avenue and 1st Street NW, and the name Rosedale Presbyterian Church was selected a year later. Before services began at the present site on 13th Avenue and 1st Street NW, the congregation had occupied two separate locations in Rosedale; the last one having the advantage of proximity to the 16th Avenue NW streetcar line.

In 1913, construction began on a church at the present site, and it was then decided that services would be held in the basement until economic uncertainty abated. Sixteen years would pass before work commenced on the superstructure, which was officially opened on January 5, 1930. Meanwhile, in 1925, Presbyterian, Congregational and Methodist and local Union Churches in Canada had formally unified- not without acrimony in some quarters- to become known as the United Church of Canada, and the church's name had accordingly become North Hill United.



Three blocks north of North Hill United in 1930, on 16th Avenue and 1st Street NW, stood the Crescent Heights United Church, which before Church Union in 1925, was a Methodist Church. Like the Presbyterians, this congregation had an established pedigree in the community, dating back to 1908. It was then that services were first held in the private residence of Mr and Mrs. Alfred Maberley, on 19th Avenue NW, then part of the village of Crescent Heights. The Crescent Heights United Church building on 16th Avenue and 1st Street NW (still standing) was constructed in 1923 and served the congregation well until 1968, when it joined with the North Hill United Church to the south, and the 13th Avenue and 1st Street NW location was then selected as the venue for the unified congregation. In 2002, membership was augmented further when the Pleasant Heights United Church was welcomed aboard, and the name then selected, Wild Rose United Church, survives to this day.

Fortunately, for those of us who are easily confused, Wild Rose has a Heritage Room, and a visit there will clear up any muddles concerning the

congregational history I've attempted to outline above. As far as the structure itself, the pipe organ was installed in 1948 and the balcony and tower were added in 1952. In 1957, the adjacent Education Centre was built.

I would like to offer a correction to the *President's Notebook* in the June newsletter. In his regular column, Mr. McDermid noted that Crescent Heights is represented on the North Central LRT Citizen Advisory Committee by two people, himself, and a "skeptic." I must be that skeptic. However, to be clear, I do not see myself as being skeptical of the Centre Street alignment, indeed, it seems like the only feasible approach. Nor am I skeptical of the planning group's focus on low-floor technologies being proposed. This line, when it is developed, will have a huge and permanent impact on the communities it travels through.

So, yes, I do try to find potential problems or downsides with the propositions and I ask questions that may have given Mr. McDermid the impression that I'm a skeptic. I am not. One final note, it is important to remember that while each member of the citizen committee was selected to represent the interests from affected communities, we are expected to maintain a "Calgary perspective when providing advice to the project team," this from the terms of reference for the Citizen's Advisory Committee. I look forward to continuing to serve on this committee and working with John McDermid in the future.

Going on a Holiday?

Summer is here and a great time to enjoy a vacation! But before you do, make sure your home is as safe and secure as possible. Below are a few tips to help reduce your risk:

- Double-check your insurance policy to find out if and when you require someone to check in on your home.
- Give a trusted neighbour or friend a key and trip details and ask them to check in on your home.
- Don't advertise that you are going away.
- Create a lived-in appearance. Be sure the lawn is cared for while you are away and stop any newspapers or have flyers collected from your door or yard. Set lights and a radio/television on timers so your home is not dark during evening hours.
- Encourage a trusted neighbour to park their car in your driveway while you are gone.
- Ensure that your door and window locking devices are working and are locked when you leave.
- Disable your garage door while you are gone. Most have a switch that can be turned off. You can also put a padlock or similar device through the door tracks to ensure it cannot be opened.
- Put away, or secure all lawn furniture or tools (i.e. ladders) so they can't be used to assist a burglar in gaining access to the upper story windows of your home.



Canada by Richard Ford is a mystery novel. Not a whodunit, since Ford explicitly tells us what will happen on the first page. Also, the novel is styled as the memoirs of a retired teacher, who has long lived with the violent events in his youth. The mystery in Part One is "Why?". Why did his rather normal parents stage an armed robbery? The mystery in Part Two is "When?". When will the murder happen? The mystery of the novel as a whole is "Who"? The most elemental mystery: Who am I?

chess, sadly playing by himself most of the time, and develops his interest in bee keeping, while waiting to go to school in September. Crashing into his carefully managed thoughts and good intentions are the bank robbery and arrest of his parents in front of the two children. In a strangled sort of logic, his mother had arranged for the disposition of her twins prior to the robbery, and Dell is called upon again to adapt to almost untenable circumstances.

Which he does. In a dilapidated village in southern Saskatchewan. Canada is the *terra incognita*. This novel plays out entirely in the mind of a well-behaved teenager growing into adulthood. His thinking cracks like the voice of a teenaged boy. He imagines that he is navigating on a successful course, only to be unexpectedly jolted by strange adult behaviours. Each time, he tries to incorporate these new lessons into his perception of adulthood, although even he understands that all the adults who keep changing his life are highly unreliable. Thus, through his own thoughtfulness, Dell does steer his future into the calm prosperity his family always wanted for themselves. He alone applies the philosophy that your life is what you make of it.
