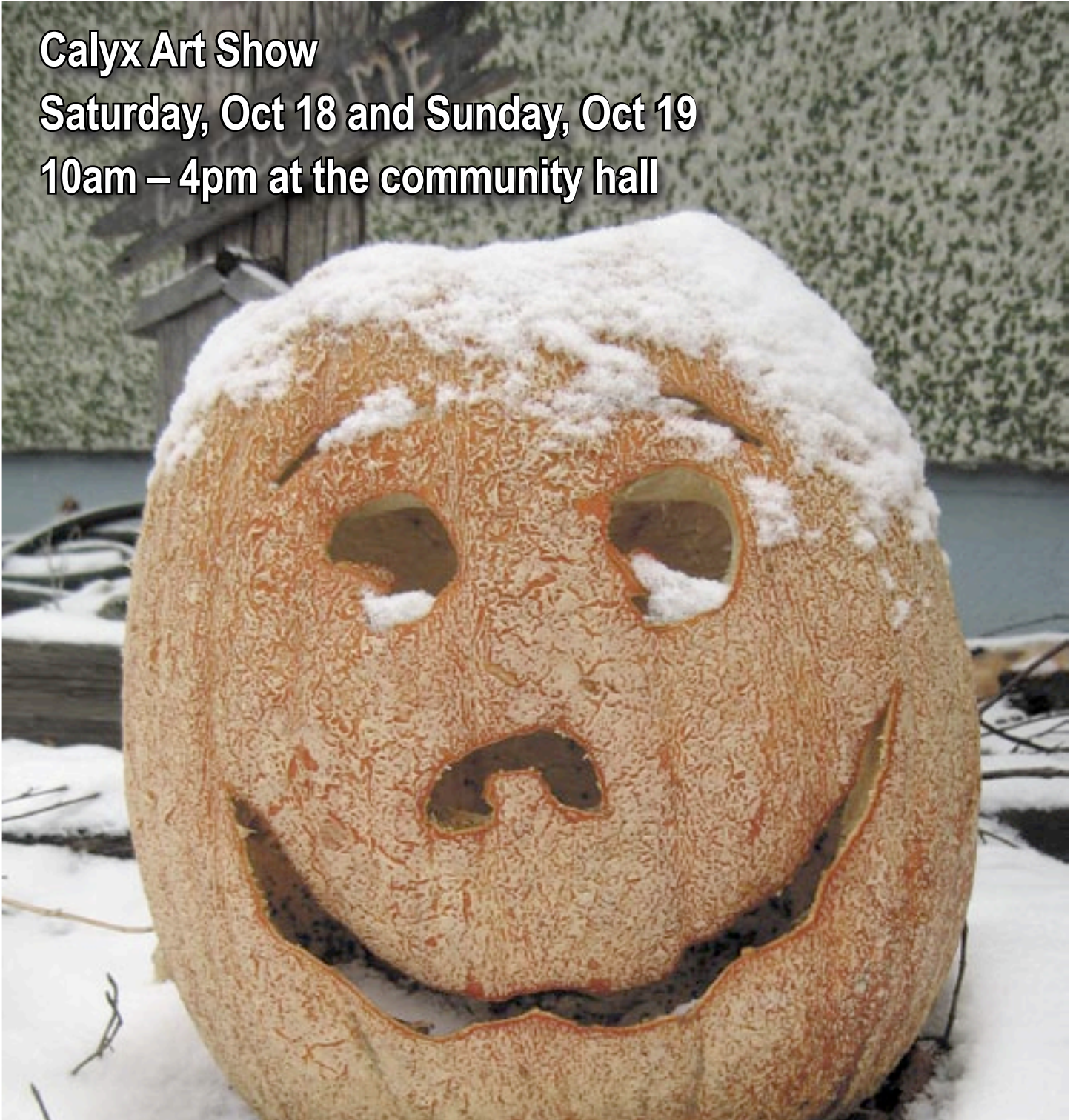

President's message

After missing the early deadline for last month's newsletter, I would like to take this opportunity to update our community residents on what was an eventful summer and several upcoming important events. On June 14th our annual Community Cleanup was a popular hit with residents. The CHCA thanks the volunteers for helping out and to our residents for your continued participation in this truly family oriented event, where treasures abound in the "looking for new owners section," that has continued to grow in popularity each year. The WINS (Women in Needs Society) also found new homes for many of the items from our event. We also thank Calgary's Community and By-law Services for their support, as well as Calgary's Solid Waste Services for taking away over 15 tonnes of waste from our community. We will do it again next year, so look for confirmation of the event date in a future edition of the newsletter.

Our Stampede Breakfast on the last Sunday of Stampede 2014 was again an even bigger hit than any of the previous years. The CHCA had originally planned to serve 350 guests, but we far exceeded all of our expectations, as the final estimate was a little more than 400 happy guests that took in the excellent food and wonderful festivities. Our thanks again to all the event volunteers who worked very hard to bring this truly community-building event together, and of course, we also thank all of you, who took the time to come out and take part in the event. It wasn't that long ago that a crowd of 275 would have been considered a success. This burgeoning event is a testament to the popularity and growth of Crescent Heights and especially rewarding to us is to see new faces at the event, and the chance to welcome many new residents to our community. Please mark your calendar for our 2015 Stampede Breakfast, rain or shine, it will be on the last Sunday of the Stampede.

Before the summer break, the North Central LRT discussion was centre stage as various alignment options were being examined and finalized. Given that Crescent Heights is the most affected community, Councillor Farrell had promised us an opportunity for community input on this subject matter, prior to it going to a vote by City Council in December. I will not advocate one alternative over another, but given that the implementation of this project will be the single most important determining factor on the future of this community - as it will affect everything from traffic circulation, development potential, residential and commercial property value, to daily living activities of community residents - I urge you to come out to this final opportunity for your input and comments. It is tentatively scheduled for the evening of October 14, 2014 at Wild Rose United Church. If there

are any changes, please call our Community Event line at 403-276-1002 ext 77 for the most current information.

Also during the summer break, in response to recent developments and safety concerns by residents along Crescent Road NW, the City has implemented several changes to the speed limit and parking restrictions along the ridge overlooking the downtown core. Together with the Rosedale Community Association, the CHCA supports these new restrictions, with the aim of enhancing safety for residents and visitors, as well restoring some measure of tranquillity to the affected residents. The new speed limit will be 30 km/hr for the entire length of Crescent Road NW and there will be no stopping allowed on the south side of the road between 22:00 to 07:00. These new restrictions will also be monitored and enforced as necessary by the appropriate City department. Thanks go out to our Traffic Committee of the CHCA for leading these initiatives, and also to Councillor Farrell's office for seeing it through to implementation.

By the time you are reading this, the exiting playground structure in the northwest corner of Crescent Park will be no-more. Activities are underway to replace the existing structures with a new playground design and fixtures. Many thanks go out to Kellee Grounds for leading this project. The initial construction of the new playground will take place October 1 to October 4, between 8:30am and 5:00pm each day. We are still looking for community volunteers to come out and give us a hand. No skills or expertise required. Just bring your enthusiasm and energy, and help us put together this community-building project. If you have some free time over the next couple of days, please come out and help! We will provide food and refreshments! Please contact Kellee at kellee_g@hotmail.com or by phone at 403-282-4381, or just come out and give us a hand on the dates above.

The CHCA Traffic Committee has also been busy with efforts to reduce cut-through traffic on 8th Avenue northeast and northwest. The roadway is too narrow for 8th Avenue to be a continuation of its "local traffic collector" designation east of Edmonton Trail. Within its portion in Crescent Heights, 8th Avenue is also designated as a bicycle route, which requires our cyclists to share the narrow roadway with vehicular traffic. Various options are being examined and discussed during Traffic and Planning committee meetings on the first and third Tuesday of each month. If you would like further information or to provide input, please contact Kellee Grounds as noted in the paragraph above.

On-going development and planning discussions proposals for the southeast corner of Crescent Heights are coming to the forefront. Amongst the various proposals in this area include a multi-residential structure at 406 - 3 Avenue NE; an assisted living facility at 426 - 2 Avenue NE; and a proposal for rezoning / densification of the land currently being used as a car wash and adjoining lots between 1 Avenue NE and Marsh Road NE. With this last proposal, the new owner of the land seeks to increase both the Floor Area Ratio (FAR) and the maximum height restriction on these lots for a potential mixed use development. No matter whether you are in support of, or against the relaxations being sought by various parties, you should be aware of these proposals, and understand how they may affect your right as either land owners and/or affected residents of the area. Please contact our Planning Director, Darlene Jones for more information.

Finally, the CHCA is trying new initiatives to reach out to our readership and residents. We acknowledge that the current monthly newsletter format is only one way of reaching out to our community. By the time you read this, you should also be able to try out our new "Community Events Information Line," which can be accessed at 403-276-1002 ext 77. It will have the most up-to-date voice announcements of what is happening / developing in your community. I understand that Mike Jankovic, our Communications Director, has recently setup a Twitter account for the CHCA, but please stay tuned for more information on that. Of course, if you need to get in touch with our volunteer Board of Directors for the CHCA, you can always reach any of us via telephone as noted on the masthead (page 3) of this newsletter.

The CHCA thanks you for choosing Calgary as your home city, and Crescent Heights as your home. Together, we can work on making this community better for all to enjoy. Halloween is just around the corner, so please be extra careful at the end of this month as the growing number of young members of our community roam about as ghosts, goblins or super heroes on their hunt for delicious confectioneries.

It's Time To Renew Your Residential Parking Permits

This is a reminder that Residential Parking Zone M permits expire October 31st, 2014. You may obtain your year 2014/2015 permits beginning September 1st from the Calgary Parking Authority.

How to Renew Your Residential Parking Permits

The bylaw requires that you present a valid ALBERTA vehicle registration for EACH vehicle requiring a permit, showing the correct address within the restricted zone AND a copy of some other proof of address, such as a cable or utility bill.

Your permits may be renewed in one of the following ways:

1. In person at the CPA office

*If faxing your information, please include a daytime phone number on your fax so we can verify your information, if required. Drivers' licenses does not fax well.

**Be sure to allow enough time for mailing.

Please don't forget your vehicle registration and other proof of address such as cable or utility bill!

It is your responsibility to renew your permits in a timely manner in order to avoid receiving a parking violation.

Dwellings requiring more than 2 vehicle permits will be required to pay \$50 plus GST (\$52.50) for the third and subsequent permits issued. Payment by cash, credit card, debit card or cheque payable to the Calgary Parking Authority will be accepted. Debit payments can be processed at our office location only. Please do not mail cash.

If you move or sell your vehicle before your vehicle permit(s) expire, you are required to return your permit(s) to the Calgary Parking Authority.

These changes are the result of a revision to the Calgary Traffic Bylaw 26M96 under section 20 (3)(a)

Visitor Permits

Only two visitor permits are issued to qualifying addresses once during the permit year. If your residence qualifies, current proof of address, such as a recent utility bill, must be provided. Permits will be issued provided that they have not already been issued for the current permit year. Visitor permits must remain at the address if you move.

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Traffic & Playground Updates

The CHCA has been in talks with the City regarding some of the traffic issues that came out of our Community Traffic Review that we did two years ago. Can you believe it's been that long already!?!

Stop signs along 2nd Street NE between 2nd and 6th Avenues - The City noted that the locations requested did not meet the criteria for four-way stops, and if installed would create more traffic problems. We have asked them to provide an alternative to slow down the traffic along 2nd Street NE.

No left turn onto 11th Avenue NW from 1st Street during evening rush hour - The City requested a petition and it has since been completed and sent to the City for review.

Speed Limit reduction along Crescent Road NW - Letters from Crescent Heights and Roesdale were requested by the City stating that we would like the reduction and the letters have since been completed and sent to the City for review.

Extend Rotary Park playground zone (30km/hr) from 6th Avenue NE to Samis Road - The City came back with the option to extend the 30km/hr playground zone to 3rd Avenue NE, which the CHCA found acceptable.

No Access to 16th Avenue" signage at 2, 2A and 3rd Street NW - The City agreed to install revised signage at requested intersections.

No Stopping along Crescent Road between 22:00hrs-7:00hrs in lieu of No Parking between 22:00hrs-7:00hrs - The City and CHCA are in talks to revise the south side of Crescent Road (and potentially the west side of 2nd Street NW as well as the east side of 3rd Street NW) to no stopping between 22:00hrs-7:00hrs.

Cut through traffic - CHCA requested traffic counts during rush hour(s) and the City agreed. 8th Avenue NE between Centre Street and Edmonton Trail was selected for a traffic review due to traffic volumes and its designation as a Bike Lane.

The Calgary Police have been patrolling our area and were surprised to report that **60%** of the non-compliance in our community was by community residents! Please remember to obey the posted no-turn and speed limit signage.

Confirmation of the Crescent Park playground build came late into September and by the time you read this, the large 5 to 12 year-old play area should be built. A smaller mini-build will be required for next spring for the 18-month to 4 year-old structure and the Dynamo Quad Pod. The Grand Opening party will be held off until the final build is complete.

Off the Shelf

Book review by Judith Umbach

Travels with Myself and Another

by Martha Gellhorn



You know the worst thing about travel

No matter how you finish that sentence, Martha Gellhorn has been through worse. It was her own fault and she knew it.

In *Travels with Myself and Another*, Martha Gellhorn recounts six "horror journeys". She eschews descriptions of calm, beautiful experiences for the excruciating irritation of dangerous water, bad food, uncommunicative natives, impassible roads, and her own boredom caused by the results of her unprepared romantic vision prior to each trip. She presents herself as a tragi-comic bungler, belying her fame as a reporter in three wars and a prolific writer of both fiction and non-fiction. All travellers, perhaps all people love horror stories. Rarely are we treated to those so well told.

Of seemingly infinite length was her trek into China about the time of the Second World War, where she wanted to cover the front-line of the war following the Japanese invasion, a reasonable venture for a war correspondent. She never found a front-line of any sort. Her companion, to whom she had to apologize for coercing him into coming with her, did more to further her journey than her guide. Roads and rivers were travelled at almost a walking pace in broken vessels that damaged body

and spirit. Air travel was undertaken as an act of faith, because to cross the Japanese lines pilots took off only in bad weather!

Wanting to see Africa, she decided on a whim to cross the continent from west to east, even today a virtually impossible journey. Her limited consultations with friends failed to impress on her that West Africa and its climate are almost completely different from East Africa and its facilities. Her efforts to fulfill her vision of informative tourism produced in her a non-pc conclusion that the rest of the world should leave Africans to get on with their own lives and cultures regardless of how inefficient they are, even though she somehow failed to recognize that Africans in different geographies have completely different cultures.

The only deep meditation on people took place in Communist Russia in the greyness of post-Stalinist Moscow. Her trip's purpose was to visit an elderly woman writer, to bring her social comfort. Six deadening days later, she understood that Muscovites loved their country and their city and didn't really mind the stultifying compromises of their daily lives. Unlike Martha – she was never so glad to abandon her independent travel for the decadent pleasures of a capitalist (commercial) flight home.

Calgary Crime Stoppers

What is Crime Stoppers?

Crime Stoppers is a not-for-profit organization operating a program that involves the public in the fight against crime. Crime Stoppers provides citizens with a way to anonymously supply the police with information about a crime or potential crime.

A tipster may be eligible for a cash reward of up to \$2000 for providing information which leads to an arrest, or the recovery of stolen property or the seizure of illegal drugs.

What do we do, and how do we do it?

Crime Stoppers accepts anonymous information from the Public concerning ALL unsolved crimes and criminal activity including: seizure of illegal drugs, marijuana grow-ops, wanted persons, vandalism, or the recovery of stolen property. ALL tips are anonymous; Tipsters are never asked for their name or personal information and will never have to appear in court. No one, not even Crime Stoppers, will know their identity.

If information provided leads to the seizure of illegal drugs, an arrest, or the recovery of stolen property, the tipster may be eligible for a cash reward.

How can you get involved if you wish to help solve crime?

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NC LRT Project Update

The North Central LRT is the north leg of the Greenline, the next new LRT line in Calgary's rapid transit network. As outlined in RouteAhead, a 30-year strategic plan for transit in Calgary, the Greenline will eventually run from North Pointe in north central Calgary to Seton in the southeast, with future extensions to the north possible in the longer term.

Public engagement

Three public engagement events were held in April, to identify the public's preferences relating to the two remaining route options (Centre Street North and Edmonton Trail Northeast).

During the three events, over 575 people actively participated in group discussions about route preferences, pedestrian access, traffic impacts, community/land acquisitions impacts and relative costs of the various options.

Information was also provided for the road layout after construction of the LRT. Three options were provided:

1. Wide: LRT and two driving lanes in each direction (requires 30 metre width).
 2. Wide with parking: LRT, one driving lane, and one parking lane in each direction (requires 28 metre width).
 3. Narrow: LRT and one driving lane in each direction (requires 20 metre width).
- Tunnel: – provided as an option only for the southern segment into downtown: LRT is underground in a tunnel, with two driving lanes in each direction on the surface (requires 20 metre width).

What we heard

There was a preference for the Centre Street alignment with a tunnel in the southernmost segment connecting to downtown and the wide road layout throughout the route.

The project's Community Advisory Group (CAG) comprised of residents and business owners preferred the narrow option south of McKnight Boulevard to minimize disruption to land owners, tenants, and businesses. The project Steering Committee (directors and managers with The City) also endorsed the narrow option to support the City's long-term land use and transportation goals.

The narrow option maintains one traffic lane in each direction with the LRT running in the middle. The addition of the LRT will mostly occur within the existing width of Centre Street. This approach will still require some property purchases, but not to the extent that would be needed if the road was widened, reducing disruption to Calgarians who live and make a living along Centre Street. The wide option can be implemented north of McKnight Boulevard, where the road is wide enough to carry the LRT and two lanes of traffic.

Next steps

We will be taking a closer look at the route on Centre Street and determining how the LRT will be incorporated into the urban fabric of

existing communities like Crescent Heights, defining how it will connect with downtown and refining the construction cost estimates for the project.

We will meet with surrounding communities and stakeholders this fall to discuss the Centre Street route. We will also have open houses in mid-October (one will be held in Crescent Heights – location and details listed elsewhere in this issue) to share our findings with Calgarians before presenting recommendations to the committee on Transportation and Transit in December, and City Council in January. Message from Councillor Druh Farrell

A Safer, Pedestrian-Friendly City

All Calgarians experience the city as a pedestrian. Whether we drive, take transit, cycle, walk, in-line skate, or skateboard, most of us start or end our trips on foot. From the people who walk to work every day, to the hundreds of thousands of riders of our trains and buses, to the bustling activity on our neighbourhood streets, the safety of pedestrians is vitally important.

The pedestrian experience is critical to the success of Calgary and its future. Over the last ten years, Calgary has made tremendous

improvements in pedestrian infrastructure; yet much of the city was built without pedestrians in mind, lacking key links within neighbourhoods and to transit stops.

While Calgary has strategies for other forms of transportation including automobile and goods movement, transit, cycling, and pathways, we have yet to develop one for pedestrians and mobility device users. That is about to change. A plan is in the works to improve all aspects of the walking experience and increase pedestrian activity through education, engineering, investment, and enforcement. It will tackle how to make Calgary's streets safe for our youngest and oldest pedestrians, how to improve connections, and how an improved walking environment can create a healthier and more livable city.

Even one pedestrian fatality is too many. We are committed to protecting pedestrians and creating a culture of safety and respect by addressing street design and behaviour. Working with Calgary Police Services, Calgary's transportation engineers will analyze data to better understand the nature of collisions involving pedestrians and guide the tools, policies, and education programs to improve safety.

We can take action before the final policy is complete. Plans are already in motion to test new safety tools, including in-road lighting and conflict-analysis technology that will measure near-misses and identify issues before anyone gets hurt. We also expanded our pilot program of Rapid Flashing Beacons with continued success.

The strategy will be the result of a 16 month effort including a series of public meetings to develop a plan of action. In the meantime, let's look out for one another and ensure that we all return home safe and sound.

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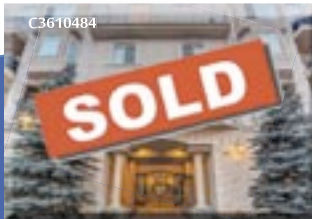
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
