

President's Notebook

As Hammer and Tongs goes the work at our increasingly pretty little community hall. While not quite ready for its close-up, the building is now sporting a nice new coat of paint, inside and out, and we are converging on which direction to take with our upcoming kitchen renovation. As I write this, new flooring on the stairways and upper level is being applied, and the overdue stripping and sealing of the main floor flooring is about to be scheduled. Although it's good to get the ongoing maintenance and improvements done, with the help of our casino proceeds and (fingers crossed) a contribution from the City's Capital Conservation Grant, the question arose at our November board meeting as to whether this is all we are about. Is there more to the CHCA and its membership that ploughing money into the hall to keep it running, heated and reasonably presentable? Should we be investing elsewhere and, with the requisite approvals from our funding sources, pursuing programming opportunities rather than just the physical plant that seems to be the focus of our spending and the principal claimant of a fair number of volunteer resources? It's a conversation that we should have as a community, poised as we are to enter a new year, with the most pressing maintenance demands of the building now mostly satisfied.

The notion of a necessary community conversation resonates of course with the remarkable result of the municipal election, perhaps most notably with the election of our new Mayor Nenshi. One or more of my board colleagues nominated me for a Community Builder award presented annually at the Federation of Calgary Communities' Annual General Meeting. I was surprised and flattered to be presented with an honourable mention at the October 28 meeting. Ever the bridesmaid, I nevertheless got to meet the mayor and have my picture taken with him. These will be exciting times in the city and its constituent communities as new and vital "conversations" begin in Calgary. As I mentioned, I was very flattered by this nomination because several years of FCC AGMs have shown me the rarified atmosphere some dedicated volunteers operate in. The annual winners tend to be the retiree who spends the entire winter at a community rink, flooding with a spray bottle and clearing a heavy snowfall from the ice with a teaspoon. Many thanks to the FCC and my board colleagues for this honour. Now I'd better earn it.

Now that the new Tim Horton's on Centre Street has been operating in our community for a number of weeks, it's disheartening to see a certain category of Tim's customer just throwing their empties on the ground. Nothing like a national brand of litter and a source for it right in the heart of our community. Probably most customers do the right thing in disposing of their Tim's refuse, but there certainly would appear to be a significant segment of their customer base who just can't hang onto the cup with their knuckles dragging on the ground.

I was working away at home on November 2, minding my own business, when a call came from Owen Moss at Bird Construction. I had inquired of Owen some weeks before in respect of what

I felt was the abiding mystery of the Emergency Operations Centre construction site: how would they get those huge track-hoes out of the bottom of the excavation? I'll be entering these shots on the upcoming community photo contest, so the rest of you can enter if you like, but I think I have the lock on it.



Tuning in to the National on November 7, my lady wife and I are gobsmacked to learn that MP Jim Prentice will be leaving his post at the end of the year. Often a welcome visitor to many Crescent Heights Community events, Jim Prentice was and is in my view far and away the best thing about the Conservative party. It was Jim who secured the funding for a facility to replace the aged wading pool in Rotary Park (as witness the pile of dirt and rubble that now stands where the pool used to). It may be said that other Calgary North Centre communities, with their

needy, aging arenas and more demanding facilities, benefited more from federal stimulus funds, but Jim made sure that our community benefited too, and very probably where it was needed most. There is a full menu to choose from, and all volunteers are free to have lunch or dinner during their shift (to paraphrase some celebrity chef, "Most people volunteer for casinos because they don't have deep fryers at home"). Join us if you can.

As the holiday season approaches, the CHCA board wishes all of you a safe and happy holiday, and a prosperous, healthy 2011.

A Man with a Plan, cont. from Nov 2010

And now on to some of the specific recommendations of Thomas Mawson's plan for Calgary. All civic buildings would be located in either one of two public squares; one at Centre Street South at the base of the bridge and the primary one at 4th Street South where Eau Claire Market is now, with a mall connecting the two. Prince's Island was a key component of the design and contained museums and public gardens, as well as two lagoons on the south side suitable for boating. Bridges spanning the Bow would be built at both 4th Street and at Centre Street. Two plans were provided for the Centre Street Bridge; since Mawson was aware that plans for a high level structure were already in the works in 1914, he provided plans for a high level structure as well as a low level structure. He favoured the latter as he was concerned the former would destroy the sight lines of the Centre Street Plaza, especially when viewed from the CPR terminal at Centre Street and 9th Avenue South. As well, he was concerned that since the high level bridge then under consideration by city council crossed the river diagonally, currents and eddies would thereby be created which would undermine the bridge's underpinnings. (No evidence of this has been seen with the existing Centre Street Bridge, which approaches its hundredth birthday.) The low level structure favoured by Mawson would depart Centre Street on the south bank directly perpendicular to the flow of the Bow River and would have arrived at about 1st St NE, though at the base of the hill. Passengers and vehicles were to be transported to the top of the hill by separate elevators; the vehicle elevator, with dimensions of 50 feet by 12 feet, could accommodate a fully-loaded streetcar. Cost estimates from the Otis Elevator Company were provided: \$46,000 for each vehicle elevator and \$7,500 for each passenger elevator. Travel time to the top was estimated to be one minute. Vehicle traffic also had the option of bypassing the elevator via a road from the north side of the bridge, which ascended Centre Street through a cut in the bank running up to 7th Avenue North, just as it does now. This road passed under bridges at 5th and 6th Avenue North as well. Over time, the Centre Street route would have proved more popular, especially with the tolls proposed by Mawson for anyone opting for the elevator. Another feature of Mawson's plan was a continuous public promenade on the North Hill escarpment extending from the Tom Campbell Hill to about 10th St NW. The points at which the 4th and Centre Street bridges reached the hilltop were also public spaces; the bridge arriving at the top of 4th Street NW passed under the promenade, which



extended through a public area at 4th Street within which a monumental structure (a church for example) was featured. The 4th Street approach to the bridge continued up to about 13th Avenue NW, passing under bridges at 11th and 12th Avenues NW. Upon arriving at the top of the cut, traffic on 4th Street NW would be immediately be diverted around a large public garden extending from 13th to 15th Avenues NW.

Two new shopping districts were proposed for the Crescent Heights area. The first formed a "T" shape on Centre Street and 16th Avenues that looked on paper very much as it today exists: it extended from Centre Street at 8th Avenue North to 17th Avenue North; on 16th Avenue North, it ran from 2nd Street NW to 2nd Street NE. The second shopping district on 4th Street NW was sited just north of the public garden just mentioned, running from 16th Avenue North to 20th Avenue North. Other public amenities proposed for our district consisted of a library at 14th Avenue and 1st St NE and a theatre at 14th Avenue and 1st St NW.

As noted before, Mawson felt that transportation solutions were central to any worthwhile city plan, and there is little doubt that our community would have been greatly impacted were his plan to have been adopted. His ideal city plan called for "radial feeders", resembling wheel spokes, bisecting circular "gyratory" routes. At the 4th Street NW hillcrest, two such radials - Continued on page 11

GREENING UP! - Watching the Wheels of Change

How exciting to ride the winds of change, and even more exciting when those winds blow positive and visible changes right in one's own backyard! That's how many Calgarians feel about our recent civic election, and how 90% of German citizens feel as a result of their flourishing renewable energy sector! Germany is surpassing all targets, setting new ones, and huge monetary and environmental benefits are accruing directly to its individual citizens, small and medium-sized companies, communities, municipalities, and of course, to Germany as a whole.

Author and parliamentarian Hermann Scheer, winner of the 'Right Livelihood Award' for his work promoting Solar Energy worldwide, can be largely credited for this positive change. Thanks to the tireless efforts of Scheer, the German government conceded that renewable energy was a priority. Together with a few colleagues, Scheer mobilized the majority of parliament to adopt the "Renewable Energy Sources Act", introduced into law in 2000. The law contains three essential elements:

- 1. Guaranteed access to the grid for each kilowatt hour produced by suppliers. This means everyone is allowed to contribute to the grid.
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The enthusiasm with which this incentive law was adopted went far beyond what anyone could have imagined or hoped for. The RES act has stimulated a monumental movement towards photovoltaic (PV) energy in Germany. Last year, electricity produced from renewable energy sources exceeded 16%, and the growth is continuing. With rewards to every level of society – from huge investments, over 20 billion in 2009, to the hundreds of thousands of people currently employed in renewable energy industries, it is no wonder Germany is leading the world in the field of PV energy production and use! Citizens are benefiting not only by access to clean, sustainable, and affordable power, but are fairly compensated for the energy they provide as well.

It is exciting to imagine that such massive change can be locally inspired and perpetuated, but in fact, local initiatives are perhaps the most potent way of instigating such change.

Would it be prudent to expect the move to sustainable energy to be led by the only industry with an interest in actually postponing such a move? Every other segment of society is, of course interested in speeding up the process, and we would all quickly realize the benefits of such a trend. Did you know that Southern Alberta boasts 20% more sunlight hours and stronger winds than Germany? Not only that, we have tremendous potential for farm 'biogas' that could completely revitalize our rural communities.

Because nothing works without energy, it is easy to imagine how the consequences of a continued dependency on fossil and nuclear energies could even erode our democratic constitutions. Thankfully, it appears that some governments are becoming aware of the ethical, environmental and monetary benefits of a grass-roots trend towards a sustainable future with renewable energy.

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

departed, one heading northwest and the other northeast, through the 16th Avenue North and Centre Street intersection. Both these routes also carried streetcar traffic as did 4th Street NW and Edmonton Trail. Crescent Road from 10th Street NW to 4th Street NW formed part of a gyratory route extending as far east as Edmonton Trail. Of note is the fact that Centre Street would not have been developed as a main traffic artery under Mawson's plan, which might have made east and west Crescent Heights seem more of a cohesive unit. Also proposed for our area, albeit only when population densities increased, was a railway connection with the main CPR terminal on 9th Avenue.

I'll conclude this article by mentioning both the positive and negative aspects of the Mawson Report, some of which I've already touched on. On the "pro" side, his far-sighted attention to transportation issues could have helped us avoid a lot of the congestion issues that continue to plague us to this day. As well, we would have done well to heed his advice on purchasing land adjacent to our two rivers for public parkways; likewise, his suggestions for a civic nursery and tree planting campaigns were admirable. But by far the biggest negative was the estimated ten million dollar expense (in 1914 dollars) required to effect the recommended changes, considering that in 1914, Calgary's population was just fifty thousand or so and city council was by then struggling with debts incurred during the previous boom years. (Although Mawson suggested his plans could be implemented "bit by bit", there wouldn't have been sufficient capital to make much of a start for many years to come; too, major capital expenditures were then voted on by ratepayers, a parsimonious lot.) Mawson has also been criticized for attempting to impose an imperial form of architecture upon a modest little city on the western Canadian plains. As well, his plan did not make allowances for the periodic flooding that occurred on the Bow River; it was not until much later in the century with the construction of riverbank levees locally as well as with the completion of the Bearspaw Dam upstream that this threat was alleviated. Finally, it will be seen that in agreeing to retain his services, city council relied heavily on Thomas Mawson's reputation as a planning "expert" and consequently there was no requirement for any formal public consultations while the plan was being developed. This is however not a criticism that can be directed at Mawson himself but relates entirely to the times in which the report was prepared.

A final point of interest: despite his wealth of planning experience, Mawson had never actually succeeded in completely remaking any cities in Britain either, as his plans there to create new radial streets in certain well-established cities called for the destruction of so many established structures that after reviewing his plans, civic authorities opted not to proceed, thus avoiding any public uproar. Western Canada may have seemed like fertile ground to Mawson by comparison!

Our new mayor showed up in time to help with presentations and the FCC forwarded a couple of photos of John being presented with his certificate. The following is the nomination letter that was submitted:

To Whom It May Concern:

Please accept this letter nominating Mr. John McDermid, President of the Crescent Heights Community Association, for the FCC Community Builder Award. John is the ultimate believer in community and for years has given wholeheartedly and selflessly of his time in working to make his City and his neighbourhood a better place.

John has been involved with the Crescent Heights Community Association (CHCA) for over 10 years as an active Board member, taking on the leadership role of President for the past six years. John has actively recruited most of the current board members, encouraging members to take on or develop roles that best suit their interests.

As President, John has been especially effective in building strong relationships with the City of Calgary, our alderman, the FCC and neighbouring community organizations. John actively represents the CHCA in many pan-city initiatives, attending city-wide meetings that support both Crescent Heights and other communities. Over the past few years he has participated in meetings that developed the City's new Emergency Operations Centre, and, as a keen gardener himself (though how he finds time we can't figure out), was particularly supportive of the development of the landscape plan.

John is a strong believer in community events, ranging from the ever popular Annual Stampede Breakfast to socials to community clean-ups and Christmas parties. If he isn't organizing the event himself, he is actively supporting the efforts of others by lending a hand to set-up, run and pull-down events. He takes the time to make others feel welcome and to encourage them to participate in whatever way suits them best.

John works tirelessly to ensure that the unique Hall in Crescent Heights is kept in good working order so it can continue to support community events. He has spearheaded grant applications for capital projects as well as ensuring that the CHCA is a regular participant in Casinos to raise the necessary matching funds. We're not sure where he finds the time to help other city organizations, such as the FCC, with their Casinos!

Not only does John recruit volunteers to help maintain the hall, he has spent countless hours over the past six years dealing with pressing issues and working with the volunteers and trades people to keep the hall up and running. Although President, John has no fear of rolling up his sleeves and leading a work crew or taking on the job himself. This spring, John recruited a new Board member to lead the current effort to refresh the hall.



He strongly supports the work of our outdoor skating rink manager and his crews. When there have been complaints about any hall rentals from the neighbours, John has taken it upon himself to directly contact the affected resident, listen to their concerns, and then works to actively bring about a change in policy, if it is needed.

John is a regular attendee at the bi-weekly Traffic and Planning meetings, using his knowledge from long years of participation on this sub-committee as well as the knowledge he has acquired through active participation in the Partners in Planning program at the FCC. He is interested in hearing all points of view and trying to reach consensus positions which support both our community residents and businesses.

As an excellent communicator himself, John has been a strong supporter of the community newsletter, The Crescent View. He produces a regular, and lengthy, monthly column to let our residents know what's happening and to discuss current neighbourhood issues. Many residents pick up the newsletter just to read John's column! Or, they might have it delivered directly to their mailbox by John himself, who gets some of his exercise by taking on one or two of the delivery routes.

Before becoming President, John was the lead in getting the Block Watch program organized in Crescent Heights, participating in city-wide Block Watch meetings as well as recruiting members and holding information sessions in the community itself. Abig believer in inner city neighbourhoods, John has worked actively with the neighbouring communities of Renfrew and Bridgeland, and the City, to organize and work annual Safety Fairs.

John loves our river. For a number of years now he has been the Group

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Emergency Operations Centre Update

The reconstruction of the roadway between 5 Avenue N.E. and 6 Avenue N.E. is complete and has been open to traffic since the evening of November 3, 2010. This roadway had been closed since shifting and settling ground in the area was first observed. Since that time, project engineers and work teams have monitored, stabilized and repaired the damaged area located adjacent to the construction site at 637 - 1 Street N.E.

On October 8, 2010, the curb and gutter for the roadway was poured, however, an error in the survey calculations caused a misalignment in part of the roadway which required the curb and gutter to be replaced by the contractor. This work was completed on October 21, 2010 and The City will not incur any additional costs for the curb replacement. Construction on the roadway was completed as scheduled by the end of October 2010, however, the road remained closed for an additional period to complete excavation work that required the use of a mobile crane. The roadway is now opened permanently although road closures for short periods of time may be required as the project continues.

Currently, construction of the new Emergency Operations Centre (EOC) for the City of Calgary continues and is estimated to be occupied by the first quarter of 2012 and site landscaping complete by the second quarter of 2012.

If residents have questions or concerns, please call 311. The safety of residents and minimal impact to the community remain as The City of Calgary's priority.






Book Review by Judith Umbach

The Constant Princess
By Philippa Gregory

In *The Constant Princess*, Philippa Gregory imbues her fictional Catalina with the infuriated patience of the actively ignored. As the youngest daughter of the imperial Ferdinand and Isabella of Spain, and known as the Infanta, Catalina from Aragon has always embraced her contracted identity as Princess of Wales and Queen of England.

The first unexpected jolt in achieving her destiny is the cold meanness of England after luxuriating in the warm, lush Alhambra for most of her young years. Nevertheless, her training as the daughter of conquerors stiffens her resolve to embody the alliance of Spain and England.

For a short while the sun of teenage love shines on her and her new husband, Arthur, Prince of Wales and son of King Henry VII. But, Arthur dies young and without heir. Catalina sinks into an almost unbearable slough of despondence, poverty and desperate waiting to fulfill her regal destiny.
