President's Notebook

Crescent Heights has been selected as a participating community for the City of Calgary's Community Association Engagement Pilot. The group will meet regularly over the coming months to review and trouble-shoot the City's Development Permit engagement framework for involving CAs in addressing continuing gaps between planning policy and implementation. The engagement pilot will attempt to identify deficiencies and address them through proposed reforms. One of the most promising aspects of the ongoing evolution of the City's practices in circulating development permit applications is the prospect of doing so electronically, which is an initiative to be rolled out early next year. This could have the effect of relieving pressure on CA Planning and Development Committees in having to respond to often, complex development permit applications within tight time frames. We will hope for the best and plan to participate fully in this initiative. I am reminded of former CHCA Traffic Director Morgan Yates' pointed and pithy message to the City on behalf of the CHCA some ten years ago in which a disconnect between transportation policy and implementation was pointed out. It seems that every four of five years it pops up on the City of Calgary's administration calendar to remember to do some engagement, hold some hands and pat some heads among community associations and tick that "Engagement" box on the grand To Do list. A cynic might suppose as much. But we are in good company with other established and inner city communities: the first meeting saw evidence of a certain amount of local axe-grinding, but in the coming sessions we will hope to focus on achievable outcomes that can help make the work of our own Traffic and Planning Committee easier and more predictable for its members.

On April 26 we had another very successful Annual General Meeting. Joining us at different times over the evening were our Community Liaison Officer Dom Laporte from the Calgary Police Service and Alderman (Councillor (!) (but one "L" or two?)) Druh Farrell. We said farewell to three long serving CHCA Board members who are cycling off the board this year: Penny Smith, Sharon Anderson-Marr and Rob Elliott. Many thanks to each of you for all of your contributions of valuable volunteer time, great good sense and prudent management of the resources of our community association, its business affairs and activities over the last several years.

We also welcomed one new CHCA member, Dave Dearborn, to the board. Dave is a long term Crescent Heights resident with a strong background in our Community Block Watch program. Some years ago, Dave had assumed the role of trainer under the original Calgary Block Watch Orientation Program, which continued to be the focus of our twice-yearly crime update and orientation sessions until the end of 2005. That year, despite our best efforts (which were probably never quite on a par with those of our program founder, Keith Johnson), our two sessions in the spring and fall were not well attended, and we reached the conclusion that perhaps our program had reached a kind of saturation point in the community. As many of you will know, the program has been in stealth mode since then, but we do maintain our Yahoo Group for the Crescent Heights Program, which includes

some 336 members, all ready to raise pitchforks and heat buckets of tar on a moment's notice: Block Captains, Block Members, Camp Followers and Warlords, every one. I am not sure if we might entice Dave Dearborn back into the Block Watch harness or not, but I suspect it will be a topic of discussion at our first meeting with Dave, back on board now in more ways than one.

That first May board meeting following our April AGM is always an interesting one. Apart from our executive committee of President, Treasurer and Secretary, our board roles are not etched in stone, and each year we redefine these board roles based on priorities and on the direction we wish to take in the coming year. I write this on the eve of our 2011 May board meeting, so I cannot yet tell you how our roles and responsibilities will further evolve for the coming year, but by this time tomorrow I expect I'll know Upon Whom the Stampede Breakfast landed. Real maple syrup will be the condiment of record once again. It's budgeted for and we shall not fail you in this important regard. July the 17th (09:00-11:00) is the date set for the Stampede Breakfast this year, so mark your calendars and check, if you would, whether you might be able to pitch in. This is a signature event for CHCA, and it is one for which many hands make light work.

The River and Pathway Clean-up went ahead as scheduled on May 1 of this year, under near perfect conditions but for a bit of lingering ice along the north bank (river left) of the mighty Bow. Twenty-three Crescent Heights residents met at the Starbucks at Memorial Drive and Edmonton Trail, there to collect their Tim Horton's travel mugs and strike out westward. (It would probably not be quite sporting to be handing out the Tim's mugs inside Starbucks, so we passed them out from the trunk of the car, which probably made it look, but for the number of people gathered at one time, just like another Sunday morning drug deal.) We had the steely spine of our regulars out, plus another pitch-in from many of our Meredith Road friends, as well as some members of Wild Rose United Church. We tackled the River and Pathway assignment itself, plus a good stretch of the Memorial Drive median, and our crew from Meredith Road and the surrounding area tackled McHugh Bluff from Edmonton Trail all the way to Centre Street. This is their front yard in a sense, and many of the problems that are evident along the river reach are also beginning to appear on secluded spots along the bluff, in the form of encampments, drug use, and other questionable activities not in keeping with a tidy riverbank and bluff. Each year organizers warn us in advance to avoid encampments, which can be booby-trapped, and this year I walked the route a week in advance and called in the location of two camps, which Parks and By-law dealt with before the May 1 Clean-up. We did find one other on the day, however, and rather than avoid it as instructed, Professor Z and I assessed the situation, concluded that it had been some time since the camp had been used, and a number of us cleared the area without incident (all in honour of our perennial regular volunteer Deb Melnik, who never came across a riverbank camp she couldn't clear out in under five minutes). At the time of this year's Clean-up, Deb was travelling in Peru and probably kicking butt there too. Thanks to everyone who was able to join us on May 1, and if you missed it, perhaps we'll see you next year.



A further initiative in which Crescent Heights has recently become involved is our Centre City Network, an affiliation of inner city communities joining together to address the rise in social disorder, which seems to be more prevalent in communities adjacent to the downtown core, as the core itself is scoured clean of undesirable individuals and activities. We are there not so much on the basis of any early indication of positive outcomes, but rather because we had far better be at the table than away from it. I attended the network's second meeting on April 20th, at which a long list of inner city issues was pared down to make social disorder the first priority of the network. Bridgeland-Riverside is definitely feeling the pain, and perhaps bearing the brunt, of the downtown core's export of social disorder to neighbouring communities. These affected communities include the vulnerable south-east corner of Crescent Heights, adjacent to Edmonton Trail in the "below-stairs" corner of our community. We have established many new contacts in the area, including the very pro-active and wellconnected joint committee of condominium associations on Meredith Road and Second Street NE. We'll keep you posted as to the Centre City Network's progress and any initiatives likely to affect our community arising from its work. That's the corner of Crescent Heights where we begin our River and Pathway Clean-up each year now (and for the last several years), as that's where our clean-up efforts are needed most. Perhaps the scope of these efforts might soon expand beyond the first Sunday in May. Perhaps we need to put some local eyes on the street and boots on the ground, get our Warlords down there. Our boots are thunder.




The Crescent View is published ten times per year.

The Babysitting Co-op continues to expand. We have lots of new members this year, and a whole crop of kids under the age of 5. The Co-op is a not only a great network for babysitting; it is also an excellent way to meet new people, make play dates, and ensure that you have a safety net if you should ever need short-notice or emergency care. If you are new to the neighbourhood or the city, and especially if you don't have family nearby, the Co-op can be an invaluable resource! Come join us at our next monthly meeting - we look forward to getting to know you.

How it works:

- Using a system of chits, members arrange and exchange babysitting amongst themselves on an as needed basis.
- All members and their families (all adults in the home) are required to participate in the Block Parent program and go through the Calgary Police Service's security screening process.
- Moms (and dads?!) can attend the once-a-month informal evening meeting (sans kids) to get to know one another. Meetings are held each month between September and June rotating at various members' homes. It's a great place to talk about parenting challenges, neighbourhood news, new things in your life, and enjoy munchies and wine.
- Community Association members in good standing pay a \$25 non-refundable fee to participate.

And voila! Your own local Mary Poppins(es) can give you a few hours to yourself.

Letter to the Editor

RE: February 2011 article titled:

Fitness Circuit on McHugh Bluff- Project Manager Volunteer Needed

Will this mean even more garbage dumped along our scenic pathway system?

A few years ago I read a cartoon that pictured a senior executive looking at a piece of paper lying on the floor with the caption: "Will someone pick that up!" How often are we irritated the same way and yet why don't we simply lean over and pick it up ourselves. Lets face it, the garbage that is dumped is by a very small percentage of the people who use our great ridge walk and a little effort by each of us could make a huge difference.

In the last number of years a number of residents have started to pick up rubbish that is dropped along Crescent Road and in the neighbourhood. I started helping when I saw Vaughn and a number of other residents picking it up and simply disposing it in the garbage cans. A lot of the garbage was

simply dropped right beside the cans by inconsiderate visitors.

With this in mind I was quite surprised when I read about the "fitness circuit" being considered on the new paths on McHugh Bluff. After getting feedback from a number of the regular residents that use the area for walking, we have summarized some of the questions that are being asked. The questions seem to be centred around two issues: (1) Increased Traffic and (2) The impact on the environment. There is also the question about making use of present facilities and the \$100,000.00 cost.

Increased Traffic

- Increased traffic in addition to the increased visitor traffic when we get the "promenade" and speeding is already prevalent.
- Where will these people park? It is already crowded during prime fitness hours with people using stairs and running and classes in the public park and along the pathway. Free fitness equipment/space draws instructors holding classes who pay nothing for the upkeep of the area.
- Has anyone informed the residents of Sunnyside there will be more cut through traffic with people going to the bottom of the hill?
- Slope erosion this slope is unstable. How long before this affects residences on Crescent Road? There already is a path running beside the stairs that gets deeper and more pronounced each year.

Impact on the Environment

- New existing pathways have increased noxious weeds immensely because of disturbing the soil. City always looking for community "volunteers" to do weed control. Was this an unexpected and unwelcome outcome of the new pathways? Will the city provide workers for appropriate non-toxic weed control?
- Slope erosion this slope is unstable how often will the "fitness stations" be repaired? The pathway down the side of the hill that is paved needs frequent replacing due to slope movement. Who will pay for this?
- Although none of the stations will be "visible" from residences on Crescent Road – the traffic and parked cars and coming and going of fitness classes certainly will.
- Existing wildlife will be further displaced this is a moderately natural area that is already being used for off-road cycling and group fitness classes.
- Increased noise pollution.

Present Facilities

There are a number of residents who use the various playground facilities for fitness work after their run by doing chin-ups, stretches, etc. One person in particular said that there is nothing you can't do for various stretches, etc. We can count at least six playground facilities in the immediate area. Why can't we encourage runners and other athletes to make use of these under-used areas that are already available without any additional expense?

We have lived in Crescent Heights for the past ten years and love the view and the area. It would be a shame if we were to overlook the full impact of adding these new fitness facilities without considering all the implications.

McHugh Bluff Community Stewardship Project

The City of Calgary Parks has identified McHugh Bluff as one of six parks in the City where they are running the Community Stewardship Pilot Program. Our target invasive species again this year is the Western Salsify or Goatsbeard (Tragopogon dubuis) which is ideal for hand pulling in June. Our hope is, with a dedicated group of volunteers, to work with prevailing winds and remove the weed from the Bluff over a number of years.

The communities of Crescent Heights, Sunnyside and Rosedale are invited to join the McHugh Bluff Community Stewardship Project in two weed pulling work sessions:

June 11 – Saturday, 9:30-11:00 a.m. Meeting spot at the south end of 7A St in Rosedale.

June 25 – Saturday, 9:30-11:00 a.m. Meeting spot at the corner on Crescent Rd just East of 7A St.

Gloves, bags, drinks and Tim's cookies will be provided. Please join us in this bid to control this weed on McHugh Bluff.

Ward 7 Update

Our beautiful Nose Hill Park has been undergoing an improvement program over the past few years in order to protect the natural flora and fauna that live in this area. The proposed changes aim to create a balance between recreational use and environmental protection. This spring and summer, the Parks department will continue the improvements, as was outlined in the Nose Hill Trail and Pathway Plan created in 2006.

Last year, the Calgary Parks Department, in partnership with the Nose Hill Parks Foundation, fabricated and installed 30 new benches. Existing benches were replaced and new benches were installed in areas where they would not intrude upon the natural park experience or damage sensitive features.

In 2011, visitors to Nose Hill Park will start to see upgrades as the Park Education and Signage Program commences. Interpretive, wayfinding, and park use information signs will indicate major and minor entry points, show off-leash areas, and help all visitors use the park in an environmentally safe way. The Calgary Parks Department will also continue their restoration of native vegetation such as rough fescue, and the removal of existing invasive species such as caragana that threaten the native vegetation.

And finally, trail rehabilitation and the closure of informal, non-designated routes is expected to start this summer on a geographical basis. The existing gravel trails will be subject to ongoing maintenance repairs throughout the spring and summer months.

Comprehensive Cycling Strategy and Pathway Study!

CivicCamp will be holding public meetings for those interested in the City's new comprehensive cycling strategy. Learn more about the strategy and offer your feedback about what does or doesn't work for you.

CivicCampers and cycling enthusiasts will be on hand to walk you through the strategy, answer your questions (where they can) and guide a discussion to solicit your input. Information will be collected from the meetings and brought forward to the Standing Committee on Land Use, Planning and Transportation. If you want to comment directly and publicly to Council members about the strategy, the LPT committee is the place to do it. Appearing in person before the LPT committee makes a powerful statement but if you can't attend, be sure to write/email/tweet your Alderman beforehand to give your feedback.



P.U.P.P.Y. Initiative Update

P.U.P.P.Y. (Pick Up Pooch's Poo Yourself), an initiative from The City of Calgary Parks, in partnership with Animal & Bylaw Services, got off to a snowy start at Southland Park. Although the snow compromised the park clean-up portion of the event, organizers were thrilled to see nearly 100 Calgarians willing to brave the elements in order to learn about responsible pet ownership and park sustainability.

The P.U.P.P.Y. initiative engages citizens, educating them about the importance of picking up after their pets and proper off-leash park etiquette through interactive activities and models. Participants tested their knowledge about the differences in appearance and behaviour of coyotes and dogs, witnessed how dog feces can enter our water system, and grilled the experts on hand with their questions.

If you were unable to join us at the Southland event, you still have three more opportunities to participate in the P.U.P.P.Y initiative.

Sunday, June 12, 1:00pm - 4:00 pm - River Park: Dog poop left in parks is not just unsightly; it can be unhealthy, too. Come learn how sickness and disease can spread to both animals and humans if pet waste is not picked up.



Off the Shelf

Book Review by Judith Umbach

A Woman Among Warlords by Malalai Joya


Malalai Joya was the youngest person elected to the Afghan parliament in 2005. Such a distinction was not achieved by being a shrinking violet. In every aspect of her life, Joya is outspoken and blunt.

Her critique of President Hamid Karzai makes tough reading for Canada and other NATO countries with troops in Afghanistan. The parliament suspended her in 2007, contrary to the constitution, for her direct, non-diplomatic criticism of powerful warlords, many of whom were also representatives in the parliament.

In A Woman Among Warlords Joya gives the reader specific details about many contentious incidents and she names names - except when the security of her supporters is at stake. Her language is both direct and passionate, especially when she quotes from her own comments to parliament, media, opponents and supporters. (For the text of the book, her co-author is Canadian writer, Derrick O'Keefe.)

Malalai Joya grew up in refugee camps in Pakistan and Iran. Educated,

well-read and with a supportive family, she began early to campaign for women's rights. After grade twelve, her family could not afford university, so she joined the Organization for Promoting Afghan Women's Capabilities and on their behalf went to Herat during the Taliban era to start classes for girls. When her actions began to draw the attention of extremists, she adopted a different surname to protect her family. (She now lives apart from her husband for the same reason.)

The impoverished people she helped as a teen encouraged her to run for the Loya Jirga that would develop the constitution of Afghanistan and later to run for election to the parliament. Throughout, she became notorious for denouncing warlords, corrupt politicians, and

military occupation. She is infuriated by the poverty and violence that prevent girls and women from realizing any of their aspirations. Her grasp of Afghan history is illuminating which helps her readers understand the events that brought Afghanistan to its current state of turmoil.

A Woman Among Warlords is both a memoir and a polemic that fills in many details behind the headlines written by our own media. The arguments and denunciations offered by Malalai Joya are partisan, but it is hard not to be on her side.
