President's Notebook

In late May of this year, on somewhat short notice, Calgary Transit held a series of three open houses to showcase two new proposals for the alignment of the future North Central LRT line. On the basic assumption that the line would be built for the principal benefit of existing and future communities North of Beddington Trail (and possibly Airdrie), the original proposal was to run the line up the Nose Creek Valley West of Deerfoot Trail, parallel to the existing rail line there. But that thinking has continued to evolve and two alternate corridors are now under consideration as well: Edmonton Trail North East and Centre Street North. Both of the "new" alignments now in the mix tend to raise serious concerns among many Crescent Heights residents. I was unable to attend but we did send out a notice of the Open Houses through our community e-mail list, and I hope many residents were able to attend one or another of the information sessions. We have also expressed urgent interest in participating in the stakeholders group that will be formed to evaluate the options, and it will be important for our community to have a clear voice in this discussion to prevent the North Central LRT alignment from becoming another "bend over and spread 'em" moment. The City's existing LRT model does not bode well for any community that it slices into, so other transit models are also under consideration, including low-floor tram-like conveyances. It's hard to imagine how a more locally-oriented rail transit model could serve the longer-haul needs of more distant communities as well as existing inner-city ones, but it will be a development of utmost importance. The North Central Line is currently said to be quite a number of years in the future, but as a community, Crescent Heights must be a very vocal part of the dialogue that will ultimately determine the route and how it will affect adjacent communities all up and down the line.

Much of the rationale for a more urban route is predicated on the fact that no-one lives in the Nose Creek Valley, hence no-one will benefit from the line's transit along it. The next step in the discussion, it seems to me, will be to demonstrate that a rail transit line built for the longer-haul commute from distant communities will be of any net benefit to inner city communities. Done correctly, it could make for a significant benefit to such communities. Done badly (that is, done the way existing LRT lines have sliced through communities), it will have many adverse impacts. Without careful planning and sensitivity to the communities and streetscapes through which it runs, adding rail transit to an already brutal transportation corridor such as Centre Street North will only reinforce its character as a mere conduit through which as many vehicle trips per day as possible are to be forced. Watch this space for further developments over the long term.

Our new CHCA Board colleague Dave Dearborn has agreed to take on the Parks "portfolio" recently

Things should be interesting for Dave and for all of us as the McHugh Bluff Crescent Road Promenade work gets underway in earnest this coming summer.

And further to last month's speculation as to Upon Whom the Stampede Breakfast landed, it has fallen upon all of us. Anne Underwood has taken the lead planning role and we are about to begin taking delivery of Real Maple Syrup. Sunday, July the 17th (09:00-11:00) is the date set for the Stampede Breakfast this year, so mark your calendars and check, if you would, whether you might be able to pitch in. This is a signature event for CHCA, and it is one for which many hands make light work. Even a few minutes at set-up or clean-up can make a huge difference. We'll cross our fingers in hope for fine weather. Sadly, our beloved Crazy Bones Band has un-banded and won't be on hand to entertain us this year as they have done for so many years in the past. Thanks to Scott and Karin and their third pal for many hours of lovely tunes at our annual breakfasts. The Crazy Bones brought a warmth to the annual event that will be hard to match. We're looking into some alternate entertainments but so far have been unable to enlist City Councilor Druh Farrell to perform an interpretive dance. We're working on it.

With so much work completed on our beloved little community hall over the past year, the CHCA Board is now embarked on some planning exercises and strategy sessions designed to explore whether we have the capacity to develop and deliver programs of interest to residents and families here in Crescent Heights. Building on the solid bases of our volunteer-driven kids soccer and learn to skate programs, we have engaged the services of Alberta Community Development and had our first strategy session on June 9. Another is to follow on June 16, and through these facilitated board workshops we plan to identify program design and delivery opportunities, but are always eager to hear from residents with good ideas about program directions we may want to pursue. If you have an idea for a program or activity for kids, youth, adults or seniors in our community, please let us know and we will add your proposal into the mix.

One such program that remains bloodied but unbowed is the initiative launched over a year ago to develop a community garden here in Crescent Heights. Our eager committee tramped around the community and identified a number of possible sites for the garden, their initial preferred one being a triangular site immediately West of the North Hill Curling Club. Part of the appeal of the site was the potential for capturing run-off from the formidable roof of the curling club, but when this proved unfeasible, coupled with vigorous and sometimes bitter opposition from nearby residents who had been consulted in respect of the proposed site, the team turned its sights to an alternate location, this one immediately south of the tennis courts in Crescent Park. At this point it was the City's turn to pour cold water on the garden. Despite the fact that an old decommissioned drinking fountain is still in place, suggesting that a water supply in right there, thus eliminating the need for hundreds of feet of irrigation line to be run from the hall, the bureaucracy and unresponsiveness of City

Parks people has effectively taken the wind out of our volunteers' sails. So discouraging did the committee find its early planning efforts that the community garden is in abeyance for the foreseeable. With luck, some fresh legs or a second wind might get the project moving again, but for this year, I have just had to inform another resident that no plots are available in a community garden in Crescent Heights. Many thanks to our volunteer committee for all the work already done; it will be of great value once the project is restarted.

And finally this month, another departing friend: for the last couple of years, Wing Lee has handled a long list of maintenance matters around the community hall. With his wry sense of humour, quick wit and endless mechanical aptitude, Wing has been there, month in and month out, to handle the routine maintenance and repairs that were needed to relieve our hall from a tired and run-down look. Not so on Wing's watch. I recall in particular standing atop our sixteen foot stepladder, which was itself standing on a section of the stage, replacing fluorescent tubes on the highest row of lights, when Wing informed me that he couldn't necessarily promise to catch me if I fell. Laughing at that, I almost did. I'll miss you greatly, my friend, and wish you all the best in this, your real retirement. Wing is hereby officially declared irreplaceable, but if anyone would like to try, we have an opening for a volunteer maintenance person, especially one who is good at high wire work.

For this our combined July/August edition, we wish everyone a summer of fine weather and plenty of time outdoors, after a surly, halting and late springtime. With luck, by the time you read this, both the new Splash Pad and the Rotary Park Lawn Bowls clubhouse should be open and operational in Rotary Park. Take advantage of everything our community has to offer and watch this space for even more in the future.

"I Can See Your House From Here" (Part Two - 1958)

Part one of this series consisted of a 1924 aerial view of Crescent Heights as well as a listing of local businesses then in existence along with some insight into the challenging economic circumstances of the 1920's. This month's offering will proceed along the same lines and will cover the year 1958.

To say that the period from 1924 to 1958 would be an interesting time for Calgarians and Albertans would be an understatement.

A slight regional economic warming in the late 20's was extinguished by the 1929 stock market crash and the Great Depression of the 30's. Then came World War Two and at its conclusion, the Baby Boom.

The rise of Social Credit in Alberta was a curious phenomenon, and took place amidst the depressed economic conditions of the 30's. William Aberhart rose to power from his roots as a Crescent Heights School principal. Drawing as well from his avocation as a media-savvy preacher, he was elected premier after promising Albertans that they would each receive monthly dividend cheques in the amount of \$25, a tidy sum back in those days. This promise proved untenable as the Alberta government was then financially in dire straits and was in no position to issue any such dividend. With the onset of war though, Aberhart managed to cling to power, and was succeeded upon his death in 1943 by his lieutenant, Ernest Manning. What really saved Social Credit's bacon in Alberta, however, was the discovery of oil at Leduc in 1947. The result was a stampede of American oil companies and investment dollars; with the ensuing royalties, the province's financial troubles were a thing of the past. Although Edmonton was located much closer to the new oilfields, Calgary had previously attracted large American oil firms wishing to establish a base in Alberta and had already become known as the "HQ" city for the industry. Calgary also had a well-established stock exchange and was thus poised to make the transition from its prior role solely as a farm and ranch supply centre to a city with a big stake in the energy industry.

Unlike the period after World War One, post-World War Two in North America was a prosperous time, and signs of growth were everywhere. While most families were renters during the early 1950's, with increased prosperity home ownership became more common as the decade progressed. Calgary streetcars were phased out by 1950 and replaced by trolley buses; gradually, however, public transit lost much of its appeal when automobile ownership became more widespread. The mobility that ensued in turn facilitated the construction of new suburbs while communities in what we now think of as the inner city, including ours, came to be seen as less attractive places to raise a family.

From the 1958 Henderson's Directory, here are some interesting city statistics with comparative figures from 1924 in brackets, where available: population-221,500 (76,000); Stampede attendance- 549,336 (167,000); building permits- \$101,564,471 (\$1,030,790); passenger car registrations- 67,219; public schools- 74 (63); separate schools- 21 (13); golf courses- 6 (2)

Prior to our commentary on the 1958 airphoto, we'll first take a look at

some of the local businesses then operating along the 16th Avenue, Centre Street and Edmonton Trail corridors. Our previous article included the names of all 57 businesses then in operation locally; by 1958, 254 businesses were present and unfortunately there just isn't space to include them all. I've attempted to provide a representative sampling of these businesses in an effort to give readers a bit of the flavour of these commercial strips. Those who've resided in our community for many years will most likely spot some familiar names.

16th Avenue NW, moving west from Centre Street (69 businesses present)

Reflecting more prosperous times and an increase in local population density, business listings for 1958 versus 1924 indicates that there were proportionately more vehicle service outlets, more cafes, more hair stylists and more firms involved in real estate construction and financing. The magnetic pull of the large regional shopping centre wouldn't be seen until much later.

And so on to the 1958 airphoto of Crescent Heights which accompanies this article. By 1958, perhaps the most noticeable change over the 34 year time span had occurred in the vicinity of Centre Street from 8th Avenue

north to 16th Avenue, as not only did a commercial strip gain a foothold there, but adjacent vacant lands on either side of Centre Street had over the years seen residential development as well. Even 16th Avenue between Centre Street and Edmonton Trail had filled in, although none of the houses on 16th Avenue shown in the 1958 aerial photo are present there today. Crescent Heights High School, completed in 1928, is shown along with some additions to the original structure while to the south the second LDS church (built in the early 50's?) had been constructed, although the McArthur home had not yet been demolished to provide parking space for the church. The images of Crescent Park and Rotary Park both reflect a fair degree of development in 1958 and it's interesting in each case to see that the same basic footprint of recreational usage survives to this day. Moving to the southeast quadrant of our community, traffic on 4th Street NE in 1958 moved in both directions north of the Langevin Bridge, as the traffic split and flyovers south of 3rd Avenue NE wouldn't occur until 1972. And in 1958, there was little evidence of the multi-family development in that same sector, most of which wouldn't occur until the 70's.

Will a 2035 airphoto of Crescent Heights include the image of an LRT line running north on either Centre Street or Edmonton Trail? Stay tuned.

In 2005, the Calgary Drop In and Rehabilitation Centre invited Wild Rose United Church into a very special partnership--The Possibilities Project. Recognizing that homeless people need shelter, food and clothing, The Drop In Centre tries to meet those basic needs, 365 days a year. However, homeless people also need a reason to live. In a world that often looks away from the homeless, the clients at the DI need to know that their lives matter, that they are not merely flotsam and jetsam, floating down the river of life. In chaos and uncertainty, the spirit also needs care. And that is what the Possibilities Project is all about--caring for the spirit through art.

With seed money from Wild Rose, the DI has set up an art studio, a place of peace and solitude where clients can come to paint, draw and sculpt. Volunteer instructors help the fledgling artists awaken their creative muse and supplies are donated from various sources. If you should ever have an opportunity to visit the DI, perhaps as a volunteer, do take a moment to visit the studio. Need A Doctor?

Web registry helps people find a family physician

Calgary and area Primary Care Networks (PCNs) have joined together to support patients who do not have a family doctor. The result of this partnership is a web registry designed to address the health needs of people without a family doctor and provide them with increased access to health services in their communities.

The registry is a secure online form used to collect information from individuals and begin a process to attach them to a family physician. To date, three Calgary PCNs have opened new clinics for the purpose of linking patients with a physician. From January 1st to March 31st, 2011, the Calgary Foothills PCN connected over 1500 people in northwest of Calgary and Cochrane with family doctors. People can access the web registry at www.needadoctorcalgaryandarea.ca

Patients are attached to physicians from the waitlist in the order they register. Due to the physician shortage in Calgary, the registry is solely for people who currently have no family physician at all. The time it takes to get a physician can vary due to fluctuating physician availability, and registrants are welcome to continue looking for a doctor on their own why they wait.

Calgary Foothills Primary Care Network is an arrangement between a group of family physicians and Alberta Health Services - Calgary to provide primary care services to patients living in northwest Calgary and Cochrane.

Backyard Play Safety



With summer fast approaching, Alberta Health Services EMS would like to encourage parents to ensure their backyard play areas are made safe. Direct supervision is the best method to reduce the chance of injury. It is also prudent to ensure play equipment in your yard is suitable for the age and skill of the children using it. Don't forget to check the equipment often and repair any worn or broken parts. Set up play equipment on 8 to 12 inches of a shock-absorbing surface such as sand, wood chips, or pea gravel. Grass will not adequately cushion a fall.

Water hazards

- Ensure all backyard swimming pools are fenced. The fence should be at least 1.5 metres (5 feet) high and have a selflatching, self-closing, lockable gate;
- Drowning is the leading cause of unintentional injury-related death among children ages one to four;
- Children can drown in just a few centimetres of water if it covers their mouth and nose.

Lawn and garden tools

- Keep young children away from outdoor power equipment.
 Serious burns may result from touching hot engine surfaces;
- Ensure that all tools, fuel, chemicals, and other hazardous substances are stored in a secure, locked area. A simple latch may not be sufficient.

Insect bites and stings

- Minimize the risk of attracting insects by not wearing strong perfumes or scented lotions;
- Avoid wearing brightly coloured clothing outdoors;
- Destroy or re-locate hives and nests situated near your home;
- To avoid a bite in case of accidentally stepping on a stinging insect always ensure you child wears shoes or sandals;
- If your child has received an 'EpiPenJr' prescription from your physician (for serious anaphylactic emergencies only) ensure they understand when and how to use it;
- If your child experiences a severe reaction to an insect sting, seek medical attention or call 9-1-1.





St. Joseph/Hillcrest Care Centre Grandparent Program

In October 2010, St. Joseph School welcomed 4 seniors and Karen, a Recreation Planner from Hillcrest, to our school for our first Grandparent Program. 5 excited grade 8 students, Debbie Heikkila, parent volunteer and Mrs. Chang, gr 8 teacher happily escorted the seniors to our school library where we would be meeting once a month for the school year.

Debbie Heikkila who would be facilitating the monthly gatherings had lofty goals for the group. In planning the program, she envisioned a writing project! Each student would interview a senior about his/her life and then the student would compile the information and write the senior's life story-maybe throw in a few computer graphics to show off their computer skills and ten proudly present it at the end of the year to the seniors. Not so...

The students and their "grandparents" had other plans. They wanted to talk, to visit, and to tell stories. The first group discussion yielded the following ideas - read together, bake together, talk as a group about a number of topics, have the students tour Hillcrest where the grandparents live, and have the grandparents attend Mrs. Chang's class with the students.

During the months when the grandparents could come the St. Joseph via Handibus (we missed a couple of meetings due to the very, very cold and snowy winter) we met and talked as a group. And talk we did!

We talked about Calgary, its growth and the changes over the years. One of the grandparents, Terry, told us that she served the first meal out of the Calgary tower when it first opened June 30, 1968. Terry also served a meal to Royalty – the Queen - when she dined at the Palliser Hotel.

We talked about who was born in Calgary, and if not, where? John and Margaret were the farthest, from Ireland and England respectively.

We talked about streetcars and buses. How in our grandparents day to ride the streetcar it cost 25 cents and how a rider would put their coins in a metal box upon boarding. How the streetcars were attached to cables and how noisy the streetcar was to ride. How the floorboards moved beneath your feet and how you could see the street below as you traveled to your destination.

We talked about hats. How every man used to wear a hat and would tip his hat and say "good day" to all who he passed or who passed him. How there were no sunglasses and the hats helped keep the sun out of the

eyes as well as protect the head. How men took off their hats to enter a church and women put hats on entering the church, hatted and dressed in their finest.

We talked about toques, Stetsons, bonnets, fezzes, caps, with and without flaps, fedoras, top hats, mushroom hats, baseball caps, and cloches (flapper hats common in the 1920's).

Around Eastertime, the students from St. Joseph were invited to Hillcrest to help make Easter bonnets. The seniors proudly "showed off" their home and introduced the students to their friend and fellow residents. There were a lot of pleasantries that day.

We talked about typewriters and computers. The students took turns banging away on an old 1942 typewriter while the grandparents told about carbon copies, white out and correction tape. Beryl recited the keyboard letters by memory and we all marveled at how strong the

fingers and wrists of the secretaries from days past must have been.

Dorothy, one of the seniors brought in her vacation photos from the many places she has traveled to in her lifetime. We looked at maps and "googled" countries. We learned some geography!

Our visits became the highlight of the month for the students, the grandparents, and the school. Younger children noticed the grandparents, greeted them so kindly, and asked why they were there. When told about the program, most said they wanted to join when they were in grade 8.

A big thank you to all the grandparents and students: John, Margaret, Terry, Dorothy, Beryl, and to Karen from Hillcrest. And to Lexi, Emily, Lauren, Anna, Lucy, Georgia, Soraya, Mrs. Chang and Mr. Durante (St. Joseph Principal). It was a great year!





Off the Shelf

Book Review by Judith Umbach

Juliet, Naked by Nick Hornby

With fine contemporary humour, Nick Hornby draws us into several lives in which nothing seems to happen; yet, by the end of the story, the characters' very selves have changed irrevocably. The title of the novel,

Juliet, Naked, is also the title of a band's "break-up" album, revered by a dedicated or perhaps obsessed scattering of fans who chat on the internet. Duncan is one of the leaders, minutely dissecting every word and possible allusion in the works of the reclusive musician. Tucker Crowe.


Rather, Crowe's absent persona misleads his fans into the interpretation that he is reclusive. Actually, having given up on music and the attendant life-style, he just doesn't respond to his fans or the media. Almost without thought, Annie writes a review of one of his albums to annoy Duncan. Annie and Duncan have lived together for fifteen years in a small, depressingly middle-class, seaside town in Britain. From across the ocean of internet connections, Tucker responds to Annie's post on the Tucker Crowe fan site.

What should she do? This is the central question of Annie's current existence. She doesn't like her job much. Her relationship with Duncan has faded into living in the same house, not living together. She has lost her motivation and sense of direction. Author Nick Hornby's admirable skill is to find universal yearnings and disappointments in the dilemmas of the friendly but rather pathetic Annie.

Tucker Crowe and the website fandom form wonderful commentaries on the rock scene and the ability of people to connect in very superficial ways on the Web. Although excessive analysis of artists and their work

> has plagued every age, fleeting fame has its own "long tail" on the internet. Nothing is too trivial and nothing disappears. But are the fans wrong? Unlike Tucker himself, they hurt no one. Only people who are interested read their articles and posts and emails. They do "talk" to each other, which is somewhat better than possibly an even more depersonalized isolation without Web connections.

> Or is it better? Nick Hornby leads us through the labyrinth of modern human relations. Some people get on with their lives. Some people just live where they are. In this novel, Annie must decide which kind of person she is.
